Ottawa, Feb. 20—The decision to drop the Arrow program will deter original development in the Canadian aircraft industry and increase the already high flow of top skilled personnel to the United States, forecast R. N. Redmayne, general manager of the Air Industries and Transport association. He said: "It's very unfortunate that on the eve of the 50th anniversary of flight in Canada, and our long aviation history, that such a major effort gets torpedoed."
