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
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## ARROW REUNION – 25TH ANNIVERSARY



It was all planned by the Canadian Aviation Historical Society. March 25, 1983 would be the 25th anniversary of the first flight of the Avro Arrow. Why not hold a reunion, open to all those who were associated with the Arrow-Iroquois project?

It was a modest idea, promoted by a few volunteers. Maybe two or three hundred people would turn up. But the idea, like the aircraft, took off with a rush. Radio and TV stations picked up the story. Those who heard it phoned their neighbours. The CAHS committee were deluged with calls. By the appointed day for the gathering (Saturday, March 26), people were waiting for the doors of the hall to open. In the next few hours, over 2500 poured into the International Centre in Malton. They came from all over southern Ontario, and from Montreal, from Florida, from California and Seattle. Everyone was there — top executives, engineers, draftsmen, shop tradesmen, lab technicians, test pilots and flight line



mechanics. But not everyone in the crowd had grey hair. The young people were there too keen lads not yet born when the Arrow flew, but fascinated by its story.

It was Old Home Week condensed into a day, as former associates noisily greeted each other after a parting of 20 years, 25 years, sometimes more. There was frequent embarrassment as name tags were scrutinized -"I'm sure I know you, but I can't recall your name!" There were photo displays, films and scale models in abundance. A succession of speakers at the rostrum recalled their part in the Arrow project, with a few personal anecdotes thrown in. Much attention was centered on Jan Zurakowski, the first Arrow test pilot. Everyone wanted a handshake, a quick chat, and maybe an autograph. Well organized, well attended, it was in all a most satisfying day. As several old-timers remarked afterwards: 'That get-together was something special. It could never happen again.'


Due to the widespread interest in the Arrow Reunion by Orenda employees and retirees, this issue includes a special insert and photo layout of some of the persons in attendance.



Harry Farrow (former Chief of Testing Services, Sopwith Laboratory) and Jim Turner (former Orenda Test Engineer).





Orenda old-timers: Stu Rahmer (Production Control), Fred Dewis (Experimental Planning), and Graham Eves (Operations Manager).






