# Three swing-tail CL-44s for Japan

Japan Cargo Airways signed a purchase agreement recently with Canadair Limited, Montreal, for three CL-44 swing-tail cargo transports. Value of the order, which includes spares and ground handling equipment, will be approximately \$17,000,000. The three aircraft will be delivered early in 1964 for service between Japan and the west coast of the United States.

Japan Cargo Airways, a new company to be known as JACO, is Japan's first all-cargo air carrier. Its president, Shinichi Hayakawa, has been chairman of Nippon Express, Japan's major freight forwarder and consolidator for the past ten years.

# Vanguard profitable — for TCA

Despite the fact that British European Airways reported recently that its Vanguards were costing \$159 per hour more to operate than the revenue earned, Trans-Canada Air Lines says it is making money with its Vanguard fleet. It is believed that TCA's relative success with the airplane is due to differences in fare structure, route lengths and possibly management and assessment methods. In 1962 TCA's seat-mile expenses were \$4.38 for the Vanguard and \$5.37 for the Viscount — and so, with its teething troubles largely overcome, the Vanguard could become the real moneymaker of the family.

Twenty-two Vanguards are in service, one having been retired after a wheels-up landing in Montreal. Forty Viscount 700s are in service, and seven are up for sale.

# Hovercraft's Western prospects

As a result of his studies in Canada, Mr. Max George, of Westland Aircraft Ltd., says that prospects of a Hovercraft passenger service between downtown Vancouver and the city centres of Victoria and Nanaimo are "definitely favorable." The Hovercraft would give a 40-minute service to Nanaimo and 70-minute to Victoria.

# Garrett making WSI precision gear

Garrett Manufacturing Limited, Rexdale, Ont., has been licensed to make proprietary products of Washington Scientific Industries of Minneapolis for the Canadian market. Items will include speed reducers, gear heads, differentials, counters and other precision products. End use of the devices produced may be for Canadian and overseas application, presumably in some of the systems now produced in Canada for service with NATO air forces.

### Sales boost for Trident

Hawker Siddeley Aviation's Trident, built by the de Havilland Division at Hatfield, England, has been given a much-needed boost by an order for three aircraft from Iraqi Airways. The order is worth \$15 million. Chosen by Iraqi is the 1E version of the triple Rolls-Royce Spey engined jet — the long-range version which will carry 85 mixed class passengers over stage lengths of 2,000 miles and more. This brings Trident orders up to 54 sales and options.
