THE WORLD AROUND US

SWISS HUNTERS—Sale of 100 Hawker Hunter F.6s to Switzerland for \$73.2 million by Hawker Siddeley Group makes Hunter Britain's most successful export military airplane, having earned over half a billion dollars in foreign currency. Delivery of Swiss order to begin later this year—completed during 1959. (Aviation Week, Feb. 17/58).

SPEED RECORD?—Both Official World Speed Record and Record for Elapsed Flying Time: Los Angeles-New York claimed by USAF for twin-J57-powered McDonnell F-101A Voodoo. Averaging 1,207.6 mph in runs over official measured course, F-101A topped present record of 1,132 mph established by Fairey Delta. No figures given, but Voodoo bettered previous cross-country record of 3 hrs., 23 min. (Canadian Aviation, Jan./58).

NORAD TV SERIES—Canadian and U.S. personnel to appear in TV film series on North American Air Defence Command. Titled "Survival", series incorporates 39 half-hour shows slated for appearance during '58-'59 season. (Canadian Aviation, March/58).

MISSILE DETECTING—Current USAF thinking on length of time between detection of incoming enemy missile and nuclear warhead blasting U.S. target is from 10 to 30 minutes depending on location of target. Antennae for U.S. long-range detection radar designed for 99 per cent probability of detection and very low false alarm rate. (Aviation Daily, Mar. 3/58).

VTOL TRANSPORT—Production model Fairey Rotodyne VTOL Transport scheduled to fly later this year. Fairey expects contract from British European Airways for at least two Rotodynes. (Aviation Week, Feb. 17/58).

SPACE PLANE—USAF and North American Aviation officials privately convinced X-15 research plane will be first U.S. space vehicle, greatly exceeding design speed and altitude of 3,600 mph and 100 miles. Rocket powerplant should provide sufficient thrust for 150-mile altitude. (Aviation Age, Feb./58).

ACCELERATE PROGRAM—North American B-70 chemical bomber scheduled for flight in 1962, operational service in 1963. Indication of importance USAF places on project seen in fact that decision was delayed only eight days after date originally set, despite difficult choice between North American and Boeing design proposals together with equipment and process ramifications requiring re-evaluation. B-70 flight test program will be highly accelerated to meet operational target date. Powerplant will be six General Electric X-279s. (Aviation Week, Feb. 17/58).

CUTBACK RUMBLINGS—President Eisenhower's Foreign Aid Program could be hurt by U.S. manufacturers' dissatisfaction over research and development programs going to foreign countries at a time when such industries as aircraft are hard hit by cutbacks and economy moves. (Aviation Daily, Mar. 3/58).

MISSILE MONEY—U.S. Government has total \$554 million invested in plants and facilities producing Thor, Jupiter, Atlas and Titan ballistic missiles. In addition, companies concerned have invested \$114 million. Government share is divided into \$197 million Air Force money and \$243 million public works funds. Figures are for fiscal '58 period and include costs for plants, machine tools, equipment and test facilities. (Aviation Daily, Feb. 28/58).

SOME THRUST!—USAF has been working for two years on a battery of liquid-fueled rocket engines which, when manifolded together, produce more than 1,500,000 lbs. of thrust. (Aviation Daily, March 3/58).

BUSINESS AS USUAL—Now temporarily relocated, Garratt Aircraft Ltd., and Sanderson Aircraft Ltd. bounce back from recent fire which completely destroyed their facilities on Malton Airport. Garratt presently doing business on Indian Line, north of Dixon Road, plans new facilities north of airport. Sanderson carrying on in space at Toronto Flying Club hangar 'til decisions reached by DoT regarding overall plan for Malton development. (Canadian Aviation, March/58).

CIVVIE VAMPIRES—Crown Assets Corp. sells 26 surplus RCAF Vampire jets to U.S. firm at unconfirmed price of around one million dollars for planned modification for civilian markets. Some are slated for high-altitude photo work, others may replace Mustangs used by some U.S. business executives. Extensive fuselage changes planned for some to accommodate second cockpit. (Aircraft, Feb./58).

Arrow Exceeds 1,000 MPH — RCAF

Jan Zurakowski Flies Arrow At Mach 1.5 On Seventh Flight

A S Avroites began punching out and heading for home last Friday, the clear blue sky over Malton was being interlaced by white, thread-like vapor trails from three high-flying jets. Although no aircraft were visible to the naked eye, many homebound workers paused to watch the flight-path patterns develop because they knew that one of them was plotting the course of the delta-winged Arrow flown by Jan Zurakowski.

It was the Arrow's seventh flight since it first became airborne on March 25th, and it was its second flight of the day. Word had spread throughout the plant that a high-speed run was on the flight test program that afternoon.

Before 5:00 p.m., the Arrow had twice outrun its two chase planes—a CF-100 flown by Spud Potocki and an Orenda Sabre with F/L Jack Woodman at the controls. The vapor trails recorded the circular patterns made by the chase planes as they turned to join up with the Arrow each time.

Then the Arrow headed west on a long curving course. The chase planes peeled away and circled some miles apart. Just after 5 o'clock, a vapor trail became visible, in the western sky. As if drawn by a ruler, the tell-tale white string of machine-made cloud cut across the blue sky. And it cut across fast!

There was no doubt among the watchers as to what was making the contrail.

"Zura's really got'er opened up today," one Avroite was heard to say as the Arrow sped overhead.

The chase planes took up parallel courses in a token effort to follow the

big delta. But the contrast in speed at which their vapor trails developed only served to accentuate the supersonic run of the Arrow.

Out of sight of the watchers on the ground the three planes joined up again, flew back over Malton in formation at about 2,000 feet, broke away and landed each in turn.

After debriefing, W/C Gerrie Waterman, O.C. of the RCAF Technical Ser-

vices Detachment at Avro, made a phone call to AFHQ in Ottawa. In less than an hour, the following message was speeding across the Canadian Press News Service wires to some 10 million Canadians who get their news via newspapers, radio or television.

"Air Force Headquarters announced that the RCAF Arrow, designed and built by Avro Aircraft Limited, achiev-(Continued on Page 7, Col. 3)

Avro Crews At U.S. Navy Missile Test Base





A team of Avro Aircraft and RCAF personnel, with two CF-100 Mk 5 interceptors is based at the U.S. Naval Air Missile Test Centre, Point Mugu, California, to carry out test firings of the Sparrow 2 air-to-air guided missile.

The extensive facilities of the U.S. Navy Base, and a number of Sparrow 2 missiles have been made available to the Canadian team, which is expected to remain there for about six months or more. The test firings will enable the Canadian personnel to familiarize themselves with the Missile, which has been announced as the intended weapon for the supersonic Arrow, bomber destroyer.

They will also serve to test fire-control and auxiliary equipment. The information and experience gained will be of great value when the RCAF starts its own test firing program of Sparrow 2s at its weapons range at Cold Lake, Alberta, at a later date.

The two CF-100s, both modified Mark 5s, are being flown by Avro Test Pilots, Stan Haswell and Lorne Ursel.

Pension Plan Campaign To Start Next Week

The opening of this year's semi-annual Pension Plan Campaign is set for April 28th. Some 300 Avroites are eligible for membership, and based on early reports it is predicted that most of these will join.

Big feature of the new program is a 3 per cent compound interest on pension contributions in the event of death before retirement or termination of employment.

At the same time, all the other advantages remain as before:

(1) This is a Group Plan. As such, its costs are lower per member just as its pensions are higher.

(2) The cost of the Plan to the employee is shared by the Company over the years amounting to an approximate dollar for dollar participation.

(3) Pension contributions are deductible for Income Tax purposes.

(4) Employees who leave before retirement have the following options: (a) cash (3 per cent interest), (b) deferred annuity, (c) private continuation.

Starch Advertisement Readership Service

Its primary purpose is to provide relative measurement of the extent to which readers of a particular issue of selected publications had seen and read advertisements before being interviewed by field investigators of the Starch organization.

Every person included in this report had read the issues of Aviation Age Magazine in which these Avro Aircraft ads appeared prior to the interviewer's call. Hence the advertisement reading figures reported are percentages of a group, all of whom had read the issue.

The report is intended to aid in evaluating the types of copy, headline, illustration, and so forth, which do the best job of attracting and holding readers.





As part of Avro Aircraft's advertising campaign in trade publications in Canada, USA, United Kingdom and Europe the ads shown on this page appeared at different times in the American trade magazine — Aviation Age. This publication subscribes to the Starch Readership Service which accounts for the following article appearing in Printers Ink, the widely-read and much-quoted advertising trade magazine...:

This series of institutional ads was used to create and maintain a feeling of confidence in Avro. Each ad is also designed to show the capabilities of the company. The campaign was run in the United States, Canada, Europe, and the United Kingdom in English, French, German, Spanish and other languages. It sought to reach the governments of NATO countries, military and aviation commands, and the aviation industry.

Ad A shows a drawing of the Avro CF-100 in action. It is firing a "Salvo at 40,000." The copy notes that, "This split second in the RCAF's radar-controlled lead collision course attack technique demonstrates the most powerful weapon in air defence."

Ad B shows a drawing of the plane circling the globe. It is headlined, "Radar Network Performer." The copy speaks of the Avro CF-100 as "the most potent aerial defender operating with the North American . . . Distant Early Warning and other Radar defenses."

Four photographs are reproduced in ad C. The largest shows a ground crew looking over the plane, and other planes are seen in the background. It is captioned, "Serviced and armed," and the ad is headlined "Avro CF-100 Night-fighters at work." The text speaks of the CF-100 as "one of freedom's most efficient weapons in the defence of North America and Western Europe."

A large shiny metallic arrow headed towards a whirlpool of stars is reproduced in ad D. Headlined "The Avro Arrow," the copy notes that that is the name of a secret supersonic interceptor to succeed the Avro CF-100.

Ad E, headlined "In support of freedom," contains three photographs. The copy points out that four RCAF squadrons of CF-100s are serving with NATO.

Basis of comparison: All ads are fullpage four-color and contain the Avro trade-mark, signature, and the line, "Member: A. V. Roe Canada Limited & The Hawker Siddeley Group." Ads A, B and D all used drawings as their illustrations. Ads C and E used photographs. Ad A ran in January; ad B in February; ad C in April; ad D in June; and ad E in November, 1957.

"When attending Credit Union annual meetings, members can exercise one of their most precious possessions," says John Wallace, Jet Power's Education Chairman, "the right as shareholders of Jet Power to vote on matters of policy, declaration of dividends to be paid on deposits, rebate of interest and their choice of people to fill vacant positions for officers or committee members."

Jet Power has well over 8,000 members John points out, half of whom are interested in a high dividend return on their savings. The other half would like to see a substantial rebate of interest charged on loans.

John further urges that members owe it to themselves to attend the annual meeting to either support or reject any motion pertaining to their specific problems. Each member alone knows what his feelings are toward higher dividends or a rebate. Those not at the meeting cannot blame those that are for getting things done for themselves.


Jet Power Credit Union is a million dollar business.

Any business of this size, John Wallace continues, cannot afford to have a minority rule.

Started in 1950 by a group of 20 individuals, the credit union now boasts over 6,000 Avro members and has total assets of nearly \$2,000,000. It is one of the largest credit unions in Canada.

Contrary to some beliefs, a credit union is not just a place to get a quick loan because interest rates are from $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 times higher at finance companies. The credit union is also interested in providing an investment method for its members.

similar to that of a public company. Members are shareholders in the organization, buying shares at \$5 each, and they are given a dividend twice monthly. This year it was $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum. Next year it is hoped that dividends will reach five per cent. An outstanding feature of the credit union is that repayments of a loan or savings are taken out by payroll deductions.

To operate efficiently, a credit union must have its money working—that is to say, distributed in loans. The Jet Power (Malton) Credit Union is in this enviable position, with about 4,500 of its members having loans.

As a point of interest, many members who have a considerable investment take out a small loan if necessary. Under certain conditions, it is more profitable to make a loan than

ed a level flight speed over $1\frac{1}{2}$ times the speed of sound today at an altitude of 50,000 feet.

"The speed is equivalent to 1,000 miles per hour. This prototype version of the Arrow is powered with interim engines while later versions will be powered with lighter, more powerful Iroquois engines, designed and built by Orenda Engines Limited.

"Because it is less than one month since the Arrow's first flight and because of the aircraft's high order of complexity, weight and size, the RCAF considers the flight to be a significant achievement. Full details of the Arrow's performance capabilities cannot be released because of security reasons.

"It is not proposed therefore to release any further specific performance figures achieved by the aircraft as it proceeds through its full test program."




