

- •H. D. (Don) Cameron was elected president of ATAC for 1962-63 at the organization's first annual meeting at Montebello, P.Q., early this month. Mr. Cameron is executive assistant to the president of CPA.
- •Rudy Jens was elected president for 1962-63 of the B.C. Aviation Council at the organization's recent annual meeting at Harrison Hot Springs, B.C. Mr. Jens, who is president of Canim Lake Sawmills, succeeds A. M. Parry of Shell Oil, who continues on the executive as immediate past president. Other officers elected include J. N. Donnelly as first vice president, and P. J. G. Power, second vice president.
- •Eastern Air Lines, Inc., has announced the appointment of John S. Anderson as director of community relations — Canada.

Mr. Anderson has been Canadian sales manager for Eastern since 1956. He has 25 years of experience in airline work in Canada, Europe and the U.S. In his new post he will be responsible for developing community relations throughout Canada, with particular emphasis on the provinces of Quebec and Ontario.

- •Josef K. Chmel, 67, president & managing director of Prenco Progress & Engineering Corp. Ltd., died October 24 in Toronto. Mr. Chmel, who was well-known in the Canadian Aircraft Industry as a result of his company's long tenure as Canadian licensee for Aeroquip hoses and fittings, was born in Czechoslovakia and educated at the Technical College in Vienna and the University of Prague. He returned to Austria in 1961 to obtain his Master's degree from the University of Vienna.
- Mr. Chmel left Czechoslovakia and came to Canada just before the Nazi occupation. In June 1940, he founded Prenco, which became an active supplier to the Canadian Aircraft Industry throughout and following World War II.
- •Murray Binions has been appointed director of sales of Collins Radio Co. of Canada Ltd. He succeeds Anthony Davies, who is moving to Geneva, Switzerland, as European military sales manager of Collins Radio Company International Division. Mr. Binions has been with the company since its formation in 1954 and was sales manager prior to his new appointment.

- •Donald A. Rumgay has been elected president and a member of the board of directors of Aeroquip (Canada) Ltd. A native of Toronto, Mr. Rumgay has been general manager of the company since 1958 and will continue to have this responsibility for Aeroquip's overall Canadian operation.
- •Edward A. Barks has been appointed chief of a new research division established in the DoT's Civil Aviation Branch. A native of Ottawa, he was officer-in-charge of the Moncton forecast office and regional meteorologist for Atlantic Provinces since 1948.

Mr. Barks graduated from Queen's University with an Honors B.A. in mathematics and economics in 1941 and joined the department's meteorological branch the same year.

Formation of the new division which he heads, officially called operational research and development, was announced early in 1961. A small staff of specialists in analytical research, aviation, mathematics and engineering has been recruited over the past year.
