

Reasoning Behind New News Format

With this issue, the Avro News departs from a format it has maintained since January 1952. The change from a tabloid to a newsmagazine layout does not mean we are getting "arty". Its purpose is strictly functional.

THE WORLD AROUND US

Here is the first appearance of a new column in the Avro Newsmagazine. It is, to the best of the editor's knowledge, unique in the field of internal/external publications. Because of the importance of the work Avro is engaged in doing, it is felt that Avroites would like to know what is being done in various phases of the aircraft business throughout the world. Information appearing here in each issue will be culled from the latest trade publications. Source references will be included for readers who might wish to look up more details on any of the items.

JET TRIMOTOR—Sales and engineering teams, sponsored jointly by Hawker Siddeley Group and Bristol Aeroplane Co., in U.S. discussing planned Bristol 200 three-jet, short-range transport with domestic airlines. (Aviation Week, Feb. 3, '58).

MISSILE RESEARCH SITE—University of Toronto's Institute of Aerophysics will acquire 16,000 square feet of new building near Connaught Labs in North Toronto. Slated as a missile research centre, the new \$550,000 building will occupy a 20-acre site to allow for further test facility expansion. Financed jointly by the University, Defence Research Board, Orenda Engines and Avro Aircraft, the project is expected to be abuilding by spring. (Aircraft: Jan. 1958).

LAUNCHING POTENTIAL—Use of manned bombers as launching platforms for ballistics missiles may substantially prolong life of aircraft like B-52, B-58 and others. Answers could depend on success of North American and Bell in development of new air-to-surface missiles. (Aviation Daily: Feb. 3, '58).

STARFIGHTER OPERATIONAL—Probably the most completely wrungout combat plane ever funnelled into U.S. military inventory, Lockheed F-104 enters USAF squadron service. More than 60 F-104's involved in exhaustive proving program. Operational Starfighters, armed with wingtipinstalled Sidewinder guided missiles, encompass capabilities of lightweight air superiority fighter, ground support weapon and interceptor. (Aviation Week, Feb. 10, '58).

CHEMICAL BOMBER—Configuration of North American B-70 (formerly WS-110) won't be frozen for production purposes for several weeks. Powerplant will be six engines, each capable of 30,000 lbs. thrust with afterburners in continuous use. Current plans call for arming B-70 ultimately with air-to-ground missiles loaded externally and ballistic missiles in bomb bay. (Aviation Daily: Feb. 17, '58).

MALTON BLOSSOMS—Transport Minister George Hees reveals \$25 million, 10-year expansion program for Malton Airport. Expect work may begin in late '58 on modern five-storey terminal building. Pending its completion, existing waiting facilities will increase 50 per cent to handle greater traffic. New airport will feature latest devices for approach control, underground approaches to runways and ramp from terminal, hydrant fueling outlets dispensing variety of fuels and central baggage room with mechanical conveyors to and from aircraft. (Aircraft: Jan. 1958).

GUIDED GENIE—USAF developing new version of Douglas Genie atomictipped air-to-air missile, to incorporate guidance system, more powerful propulsion unit and longer range. Version now in service with Air Defence F-89 Scorpion squadrons is rocket-propelled but has no guidance system. (Aviation Week: Feb. 10, '58).

HIGH-ALTITUDE RUSSIAN—Soviet Defence Ministry says one Russian fighter now in production and operational use "frequently" reaches altitudes over 62,000 ft. Aircraft is probably MiG-21. (Aviation Week: Feb. 10, '58).

END VET TRAINING—Next March will see end of Refresher Flying Training Program for veteran RCAF pilots through Royal Canadian Flying Clubs Association. Begun in 1950, plan was to have a select nucleus of pilots maintain a degree of proficiency for emergency service as staff pilots or instructors. Changing trends lessen priority of scheme in defence planning. (Aircraft: Jan., '58).

SUPER BOMARC—What could be first anti-missile missile is likely to be taken from under current security wraps soon. USAF hopes to approve advanced development of Bomarc missile in near future (Aviation Daily: Feb. 3, 1958).

Avroite's Dollar Popular, Mint One Million Pieces

The new British Columbia Centennial silver dollar recently issued by the mint, and designed by Avro blockmaker Steve Trenka, shows no signs of suffering in any way from recent adverse publicity concerning the Indian significance of the Toten Pole design.

When asked on a recent trans-Canada radio program on CBC if he considered the new dollar cursed, a Haida Indian replied:

"... a buck's a buck, I wouldn't refuse one."

R. C. Frise, Manager of the Malton branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia, says the demand for the new silver dollar locally is very heavy. He can't get enough of them. Finely-minted collectors pairs are available at \$2.50 a set from the mint and Mr. Frise says that the new dollars are bringing \$1.50 each in New York as well as raves from coin collectors on the aesthetic excellence of the totem pole design.

Royal Ontario Museum experts have failed to find any basis to a reported west coast story that Indians there claimed the totem depicted is the mortuary pole of the Tsimpseam tribe, and to carry the coin would be to court death.

Steve Trenka cannot understand all the hub-bub.

"I didn't copy the design from anything", he said. "I created the totemic

design based on B.C. Indian carvings in general. The design undoubtedly resembles many totems, particularly the Haida house pole, because both are based on an Indian raven legend."

Actually the controversy seems to have developed a more-than-usual interest in the new coin since demands for it are so heavy. In an effort to meet the demands, the mint-superstitious Indians notwithstanding - is turning out one million of them.

J. A. Morley Heads Subsidiary In Belgium

J. A. Morley, Vice-President Sales and Service has been elected to also serve as President of the recentlyformed Avro subsidiary in Europe, Avro Aircraft Services Limited.

J. L. Plant, Avro's Executive Vice-President and General Manager, has been appointed a Director.

The subsidiary company was established at the close of last year and has since set up in Brussels, Belgium to provide a direct link between the Belgian Air Force and Avro Aircraft. The main function of the European subsidiary to date is in the assistance being provided the Belgian Air Force

tional efficiency. This requires adequate trained manpower, efficient servicing and adequate spares, which is, in turn, the prime responsibility of Avro Aircraft Services Limited.

The office in Brussels is being handled on the spot by J. W. Kenny, Vice-President and General Manager, who was formerly Experimental Manager at Malton.

Committee Explores Various Proposals For Future Projects

To assist in the planning of future operations of the company, a Long Range Planning Committee has been established as an adjunct to the Avro Management Committee. The Committee has been holding weekly meetings since September 19, 1957, and is concerned principally with the company's future in five to ten years.

The Chairman of the Committee is Wesley V. Hurley, Assistant to the President, and the Vice-Chairman is Don Rogers, Chief of Flight Operations. The other members are: Bill Stephens, Sales Manager, Mario Pesando, Chief Project Research Engineer, Colin Johnson, Budgets & Estimates Controller, Stan Wilson, Industrial Engineering Manager. Erie McMurtrie, Salary Administrator. Don Muggeridge, Secretarial Assistant Finance, is Secretary to the Committee.

Activities in the Committee thus far have centered on product planning and resources planning. The first of these is concerned with the exploring of the various possibilities for development projects and the investigation of the potential market for those showing promise. The second is concerned with an assessment of the human and material resources which may be required for future operations and planning for their development or provision.

Five-Dollar Fee Is Not Insurance

Payment of the additional \$5 fee (upon failure to produce proof of motor vehicle liability insurance when obtaining 1958 motor vehicle licenses) does not relieve the motorist of liability in any way, points out N. E. Kindell, Secretary of Avro Aircraft.

"This question has been brought up by some people here at Avro." Mr. Kindell said, "All Avroites should be reminded that this \$5 fee does not represent an insurance premium, it is simply a penalty imposed on those who insist on owning or operating a motor vehicle without liability insurance."

He said a motorist must show proof he carries insurance covering at least \$10,000 for death or injury to one person, \$20,000 for death or injury to two or more persons, and \$5,000 for damages to property. Failure to prove this insurance coverage means a \$5 fee, which goes to the Unsatisfied Judgement Fund for the benefit of victims of the uninsured driver. The

maximum amounts which may be claimed from the Fund have been increased to \$10,000 for death or injury to one person, \$20,000 for death or injury to two or more persons in any one accident and \$2,000 for damage to property. Victims of the hit-and-run driver are still without recourse to the Fund for property damage however.

Sixteen senior procurement managers of the A. V. Roe Canada group of companies—the people responsible for the buying by their respective companies—recently held a two-day meeting to discuss the broad responsibilities of their work and to exchange ideas.

Norm Lucas, Procurement Manager, and Bill McKeag, represented Avro at the meeting, which led to better understanding and greater knowledge of each company's area of operations.

For many, it was their first close look at the A. V. Roe Canada organization with which their companies recently became associated.

Until it happened!


One morning last summer, Denny came to work as usual. Bill Barnett, a co-worker, thought Denny seemed preoccupied and casually asked him what was on his mind.

Beginning immediately the Company is making Salk anti-polio vaccine available, free, to all employees. This vaccine will be administered in the Plant Hospital to any employee who wishes to avail himself of the service, it is announced by D. G. Lingwood, Employee Services Manager.


Interested employees are asked to deal with the hospital through their supervisor. When approached, a foreman or supervisor will call the hospital—Locals 2221 or 489, on behalf of an employee or employees in his department. The hospital staff will then give him appointment times when the vaccine will be administered.

By following this procedure, foremen or supervisors can prevent overburdening the hospital and causing lost time. In addition, they can acquaint themselves with those members of their department who wish to obtain the vaccine.

Each Avroite applying will need three inoculations. The first shot is administered when the employee applies. Hospital records will then show the times the next two are due for each individual. Generally, the second shot comes one month later and the final shot seven months after that.

Avroites will be notified by the hospital when each succeeding shot is due.

Wayne and Shuster did great guns in the USA recently, and we're not surprised. Last week's show was top flight as usual.




