

Canada's standing as a world aircraft building power soared to new heights today as the Avro Jétliner will now enter a period of flying and shake-down in its maiden flight, bringing to fruition three years of preparation, planning and hard work.

Newest contender in the world's air transport race, the Jetliner lifted from the Malton runway at 3.25 p.m.

Sixty minutes later the high-tailed, slim-bodied 50-pasenger four-engined plane landed after its test flight.

"The jetliner will now enter a period of flying and shake-down priod of flying and shake-down tests to qualify for its certificate of airworthiness," said Walter Deisher, Avro Canada's general manager.

"We do not plan to offer it to interested airlines until it has met every test and trial."

Malton-N.Y.In Hour Record By Jetliner In First Mail Trip

New York, April 18—(UP)—A Canadian Jetliner flew from Toronto to New York in 59 minutes and 56 seconds today, completing the first Canada-United States jet-propelled passenger transport flight in slightly more than one-half the time required by conventional air liners.

The four-engined plane, built by A. V. Roe Canada Ltd., landed at Idlewild Airport at 10:33 a.m. (EST). It took off from Malton Airport at 9:31 a.m. and was over Idlewild at

10:30 a.m.
