



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Avro Recreation Club Moves To Incorporate

After considerable study of the position of the Recreation Club with respect to its recognition as a legal entity, the Recreation Club executive Board has moved unanimously to proceed with its incorporation.

The Executive Board strongly feels there are many areas in which the recreation program could expand by taking this step. For example, wherever facilities are required to conduct the club activities it is necessary in the club's present non-incorporated state, to pay charges of rental, etc. for such use, and repeat this constantly throughout the program. Where on the other hand, by being an incorporated club, it will be in the position to purchase or lease facilities that would become club assets and thereby give the club the opportunity of growing. The Executive Board (the people the membership has elected bi-annually) consider that an organization such as this club with a membership of close to eight thousand people should stand as a duly recognized legal body in all its business transactions. There are many other advantages aside from these, to be gained by taking this step but space of course does not permit outling them all here. However, it is hoped that the members of the Recreation Club will discuss this subject with their respective area representatives and ask questions to familiarize themselves with the new position of the Club.

Further information such as general membership meetings, elections, activity and financial reports etc. will be published through the Newsmagazine and the bulletin boards as it becomes available.

Area representation as it now stands will of course continue as in the past and all other aspects such as membership dues, relationship with the company etc. remain unchanged.

Reports On Plans To Observe Canada's 50th Anniversary Of Powered Flight

Progress in planning for the national observance of the 50th Anniversary of Powered Flight in Canada throughout 1959 is noted in a report to the aviation industry by Arthur H. Stewart, Avro's Public Relations Manager and Chairman of the Information Committee of the Air Industries and Transport Association. The report went out to all member companies across Canada that are associated with AITA in order to acquaint them with the latest developments in the Anniversary programming prior to AITA's Annual Meeting in Quebec City during the first week of November.

The Anniversary was conceived by the Information Committee of AITA and organized by that group.

The first step was the formation of a National Council comprising government and commercial organizations that are directly associated with aviation. The Council in turn is coordinating and assisting local Committees in Metropolitan centres across the country for a truly national observance.

This Council over the past several months has been strengthened and expanded to now include in its final membership the following organizations:

Headquarters for the Council has been established in the Canadian Aeronautical Institute headquarters at Metcalfe Street, Ottawa, with a full-time Coordinator—Wing Commander Harold Pearce (Rted.)—at this office.

The Executive of the National Council comprises: Arthur H. Stewart, Avro's Public Relations Manager; Gordon J. Stringer, Canadair's Public Relations Director; Roy Kervin, Aviation Editor, Montreal Gazette; Charles Luttman, Secretary, Canadian Aeronautical Institute; Wing Commander Harold Pearce, National Coordinator.

In his report to the aviation industry, Mr. Stewart pointed out that there is every indication that next year's Canadian International Air Show will

be an outstanding dramatically staged highlight of the across-Canada observance. Meetings are already scheduled for next month in Toronto to start the planning for this major effort.

The report stated: "May I reemphasize that it has never been the intention of the National Council to stage a very ambitious and extensive program but instead, to assure that Canadians are made aware of the contributions of aviation to the growth of the country since its inauguration on February 23, 1909.

"Thus, the program is proceeding along the following lines:

- "Representations have been made to the Right Honourable the Prime Minister of Canada by the national council through its co-ordinator, Wing Commander Harold Pearce, for action in the anniversary year of 1959 through the establishment of a Canadian aeronautical museum. The council has received a most encouraging reply to this submission.
- 2. "Organization is well advanced for the establishment of contests for detailed, engineering scale models of aircraft that have played an historic, important part in Canada's economic development. This project is being principally sponsored by the RCAF which is considering a tour of Air Division in Europe for outstanding students deemed to have contributed most to this project. The RCAF estimates a potential of one million youths to be brought into this project.
- 3. "Good progress is reported in the editing and compilation of a special Golden Anniversary of Flight film being produced by the National Film Board with the financial assistance of the Department of National Defence and the Department of Transport. The film will appear first over trans-Canada television network in both English and French, in three separate showings of onehalf hour each. Later the film will be televised in the U.S.A., U.K. and European NATO countries. Then, prints of the film will be made available to service clubs, organizations and the like, across Canada and throughout the western world as an outstanding prestige-builder for the Canadian aviation industry.
- 4. "Favourable contact has been established with surviving members of the Alexander Graham Bell family to ensure their co-operation and presence at a projected unveiling of an appropriate cairn at Baddeck, Cape Breton, the scene of the first powered flight in Canada. As you will recall, that flight was financially and otherwise supported by Alexander

A. V. Roe Canada Annual Report Shows Group Expansion

The program of growth and diversification of A. V. Roe Canada Limited produced a 57.8% increase in consolidated net sales; a 15.2% increase in consolidated net profits and a 113% increase in consolidated assets during the fiscal year ended July 31, 1958 over the 1957 period, the 1958 Annual Report of A. V. Roe Canada Limited shows. Percentages reflect inclusion of Roe's share of the earnings of Dosco for only ten months ending July 31, 1958.

In their message to shareholders, however, Sir Roy H. Dobson, Chairman, and Crawford Gordon, President and General Manager, state that "due to general economic conditions, earnings did not reach expectations."

Consolidated net sales were \$370,-751,856 compared with \$234,811,024 for the 1957 year. Net profits were \$8,283,071 compared with \$7,177,001 in 1957. The 1957 figures do not include the operations of Dosco, whereas the consolidated net earnings for 1958 include Roe's share of the earnings of Dosco for the ten months ending on July 31, 1958.

With the number of common shares issued and outstanding up from 4,763,500 at the end of fiscal 1957 to 8,111,941 at the end of fiscal 1958 and the effects of the business downturn, earnings per common share dropped from \$1.50 to 92 cents.

Acquisition of the 77% interest in Dosco contributed substantially to the increase in consolidated assets from \$145,754,527 to \$310,400,714 and the doubling of employment to a 1958 total of 41,000 people.

The Report states that as a result of the events of the year, Roe has achieved its aim of broadening its industrial base. The scope of activities of the company now range from mining basic materials to the manufacture of products ranging from screws, wire and nails to intricate electro-mechanical devices, advanced aircraft, jet engines, railway rolling stock and equip-

ment, highway trailers, buses, and naval and merchant ships.

The Report warns against the dangers of Canadian dependence on other countries in the matter of creative technical thinking. "It has been easier to import ideas and know-how from others rather than to provide them ourthe Report notes, and adds, selves" "in such dependency there is a good measure of hazard to the realization of our full potential. The danger lies not so much in the importations themselves as in the possibility that, by relying on them too much, our own incentive to do things ourselves is reduced."

The Report states that Roe will continue its policy of making Canada more independent creatively as this is in

the interest "of our own corporate development and Canadian progress". In the long run, the Report says "Canada's economic growth will be closely related to its scientific and technological efforts."

Companies in the Roe Group have been pursuing these policies vigorously and the Report indicates there has been particular effort in those areas where diversification of activity is desirable.

Avro Aircraft, for instance, along with CanCar, is investigating newer forms of public transportation. Avro's Engineering Department is now engaged in studies of monorail transit systems. The Report says that this has important implications for the



Request Avroites' Aid In Survey To Alleviate Traffic Congestion



Credit Union Expresses Confidence In Future

Subsequent to the Prime Minister's recent announcements on the future air defense policy for Canada there have been many distorted reports concerning the effect on Avro Aircraft Limited and Orenda Engines Limited. These reports disturbed some members of the Jet Power (Malton) Credit Union to the extent that there have been questions concerning the ability of the Credit Union to protect the savings of its members and continue loans when required. The following statement has been issued by the Board of Directors of the Jet Power (Malton) Credit Union Ltd.:

"There is nothing in the Prime Minister's recent statements which suggests cancellation of any contracts presently in force at Avro or Orenda. There is therefore no need for the Credit Union to seriously restrict its service to the more than 8,000 members who for the most part are employees of either Avro or Orenda. After 8 years of operation your Credit Union has assets in excess of \$2,000,-000. During this 8 year period there has been several situations comparable to the present yet we have shown steady growth and have extended our services year by year and will continue to do so. The Credit Union has sufficient liquid assets and resources to meet any conceivable emergency. It is therefore the duty of each member to continue to save wisely and borrow wisely to maintain a satisfactory standard of living for the present and the future. It is the duty of the officers of the Credit Union to continue the same sound business principles which have made our organization financially successful and still serve the needs of the members at all times."

In an effort to solve some aspects of the rush-hour traffic difficulties in the Malton area, Avro Aircraft is co-operating with the Toronto Township Police who are making a study of the situation in an effort to alleviate the condition in some way.

As part of the company's effort in this regard, the full co-operation of all Avroites is earnestly solicited. In this connection all employees will be receiving a prepared questionnaire which includes a layout of the plant buildings and parking areas. Every driver is requested to mark with an X the building he works in, which parking area he uses, and (with a drawn line) show the route taken from the parking lot he normally travels home indicating the general direction he turns on reaching the highway.

It is also requested that drivers show the route taken at Dixon Road and 27 Highway—i.e. left or right turn, or whether you continue East. If applicable, show the route taken at Malton four corners indicating left or right turn or continuing north. These pertinent details are necessary for the accurate compilation of the Traffic survey.

For everyone's convenience, Box containers will be made available at all entrances. Employees are requested to fill in the Survey Sheet carefully, fold it neatly and deposit it in the container.

Canada Savings Bonds On Sale October 22nd

Beginning October 22nd, the 1958 Series of Canada Savings Bonds will become available to Avroites through the payroll deduction scheme. Each of the seven divisions of the company will have its own chairman and canvassers to approach everyone in their division so that all Avroites will be given the opportunity to buy.

Canada is the only country to offer such a bond, with terms tailored to suit the individual investor, and payments spread over as long a period as a year. Canada Savings Bonds will be on sale at par until November 14th. CSB offer the individual a completely safe method of saving money and also earning a substantial interest rate on his investment, it is pointed out.

The 1958 Series of bonds carry coupons designed to give the investor an average return of 4.19% annually on his money if the bonds are held to the maturity date. The coupons bear interest at $3\frac{1}{2}\%$ for the first year and $4\frac{1}{4}\%$ for the next 14 years.

These bonds are fully convertible at any bank at any time during their life for the full face amount plus accrued interest.

Graham Bell and his wife. This project is under the sponsorship of the Canadian Aeronautical Institute and will occur as a part of the 1959 annual meeting in June at Cape Breton.

- 5. "Plans are well advanced for a banquet sponsored by the Canadian Aeronautical Institute, with associated engineering and aviation industry organizations present, in the Queen Elizabeth hotel in Montreal on the evening of the actual anniversary date, February 23, 1959. The main speaker will be an outstanding Canadian.
- 6. "On the morning of the anniversary date, at the site of the first flight—Baddeck, Cape Breton—an exact replica model of the Silver Dart will be flown for a short distance with special mail from the Prime Minister of Canada to the Prime Ministers of other Commonwealth countries. The mail will be picked up by jet powered aircraft after the flight of the Silver Dart and transported to London. The Silver Dart has already been shown at the Canadian National Exhibition where it has attarcted very keen interest.
- 7. "Enthusiastic organization of local area committees is proceeding from British Columbia to Cape Breton. Such committees are being organized in the principal, metropolitan centres most closely associated with aviation—both commercially and militarily. Close liaison has been established and is being maintained between the national council office in Ottawa and the local area committees. Principal media of this liaison

is being supplied through the production of a booklet with relevant and appropriate material to provide guidance and assistance on a broad policy level to the respective local chairmen and their committees. This booklet is being produced gratis by an Ottawa newspaper and is being edited by the national council co-ordinator, Wing Commander Harold Pearce. It is kept up to date with periodic revisions by the co-ordinator.

8. "Basic material for local area publicity is being provided by the national council Publicity Committee. chaired by Roy Kervin, aviation editor of the Montreal Gazette and Canadian director of the Aviation Writers Association. This information is in the form of a 'kit' and comprises such basic material as Canadian aviation historic dates, brief summary of outstanding Canadian aviation achievements and the like. The editors of every individual Canadian newspaper-both English and French-have been contacted by the national co-ordinator with an explanation as to the objectives of the golden anniversary program.

 "Speakers' panels are being organized coast to coast to address service clubs, etc., on aviation themes during the anniversary year."

"You will appreciate", Mr. Stewart concluded, "that the above projects are merely representative highlights of a national observance that will be considerably enlarged and extended by purely local efforts; also, that these local efforts will take on a specific interest and characterization for their respective areas."



Once seated in the comfortably small and intimate auditorium, your eyes are immediately taken by the curtainless stage and grimly drab prisoner-ofhorrific shudder momentarily runs through you. Certainly a algebraic equation can be dreadfully dull business, but this novel introduction to the York Community Theatre presentation of Stalag 17 at at 49 LaPlante Avenue.

Under the steady hand of director, Donald H. Ford, a young man who combines robust imagination with excellent visual groupings and lucid stage movements among his large cast of eighteen. Stalag communicated fully to an appreciative audience its rowsing mad-cap humours and mystery-book intrigues.

The story takes place at Christmas time, 1944, in a POW camp somewhere in Germany. The inmates of a certain barrack room discover they have a traitor in their midst who is conveying lethal information to the company commandant. By the time the play has concluded, the men have ferreted out his identity and have dispatched him to a violent death which neatly contributes to the successful escape of two of

While this sounds like grim stuff, the mood of the piece is essentially one of comedy brought out by the human foibles and passions of the characters themselves. To this end, Jim Beggs and Donald Myers as Stosh and Shapiro respectively, do hilarious justice to their meaty parts.

Also of standout proportions was Lionel Levy who is employed here at Avro as an aerodynamicist in the Aerolastics Section. As Corporal Shultz, he gives his role a strident military flourish sensitively underlined by an enigmatic mixture of compassion and treachery.
