## -NAMES IN THE NEWS

L. L. (Slim) Jones has been appointed manager of the aviation department of Shell Oil Company of Canada, Limited, replacing Basil Rabnett, who has been promoted to a managerial position in the newly formed manufacturing department. Slim Jones brings to his new assignment more than 16 years' association with aviation activities. He spent eight years in the RAF, serving with Transport and Coastal commands, and was discharged from the service in 1946 with the rank of Wing Commander. He was awarded the DFC and the AFC.

Following his discharge, Mr. Jones joined Shell's aviation department and has served with that department in sales and administrative capacities until assuming his present position.

F. T. Wood, previously director of facilities and supply control for TCA, has been named administrative assistant to Pres. G. R. McGregor. Born in Bromley, Kent, and educated in Montreal, Mr. Wood is one of the airline's first employees, joining the TCA in '37 as secretary to the vice-president. Prior to that, he served for 15 years with the CNR. During World War II, Mr. Rippingille was in charge of the manufacturing project for the GM "Pancake" Diesel engine, which was widely used in sub chasers and patrol craft. He is on the board of directors of the London Chamber of Commerce and is a member of the Commercial Intelligence Committee of the Canadian Manufacturers Association. He was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., and completed his education in Detroit.

Other Department of Defence Production appointments include: that of Dr. Donald M. Morrison as head of the petroleum division, succeeding Dr. O. B. Hopkins; that of G. M. Grant, CBE, as director of the electronics division, succeeding A. H. Zimmerman.

Major appointment changes in Avro Canada's aircraft division were recently announced by Crawford Gordon, Jr., president and general man- \* ager. Mr. Gordon said that Edgar H. Atkin, formerly chief engineer, takes the newly created position of technical director. His duties will be to investigate design trends outside the company and new fields of development. He will contact engine firms and review the company's technical facilities as well as advise on its technical education and training. Mr. Atkin will also act as the representative of the company on joint bodies set up by the National Aeronautical Establishment and other government agencies.

James C. Floyd, formerly works manager, and previous to that, chief design engineer for transports, becomes chief engineer; and Dennis E. Previously he held the now non-existent position of executive vice-president.

Ernst Carl Robert Ljungberg has been appointed secretary general of ICAO succeeding **Dr.** Albert Roper, who retired. Mr. Ljungberg was director general and president of the Royal Board of Civil Aviation in Sweden at the time of his recent appointment.
