Abbotsford attractions

Canadian show draws varied participants and 250,000 visitors

DESCRIBED PERHAPS a little optimistically by its organisers in British Columbia as North America's largest airshow, Abbotsford drew its usual 250,000 crowd in perfect weather on August 8–10, reports Jack Meadows.


Despite military aviation economies, there was as good a flying display as ever — some 40 "turns" spread over 7hr, with plenty of noise, power, history, skill of individual and formation aerobatics, and even a Stealth Bomber. This year the show

coincided with the biennial Airshow Canada, North America's aerospace trade show, which continues to grow and impress as a world-class event.

To the hardened airshow-goer, the unexpected small sidelines are often as interesting as the main attractions. At Abbotsford a visiting North American NA-50 fighter of the late Thirties was one such gem. Another was Lockheed 10A Electra CF-TCC from the Western Canada Aviation Museum at Winnipeg: one of the first two aircraft to

equip newly-formed Trans Canada Airlines in 1937, it was taken over by the RCAF for the duration of World War Two (during which I flew it, as 7631, at the RCAF's Central Flying School at Trenton in 1943). Now deservedly cosseted in a heated hangar during the winter, it spends summers on the charity trail, flown by off-duty Air Canada captains to give C\$100 pleasure-flights, the proceeds from which help provide Disneyland holidays for underprivileged children.
