THE WORLD AROUND US

GET U.S. CONTRACT—Canadian Applied Research Ltd. to build Mark 5 Airborne Profile Recorders for installation in all USAF aerial survey Lockheed C-130 Hercules. Canadian-developed APR is considered a principal piece of equipment for making topographic maps from the air. (International Aviation, March 13, '58).

SOVIET AIR STRENGTH—NATO sources report Soviet Russia's Air Force has some 20,000 aircraft. In addition, Soviet Tactical Air Force, under command of Red Army, has about 700 MIG-17 fighters and 100 D-28 jet bombers. There are about 3,000 planes in Soviet satellite air forces in Europe. Number of airfields with extended runways for jet operations in Eastern Europe between the Vistula and Oder rivers more than tripled in the last three years. Polish Air Force current inventory about 500 aircraft. Czech Air Force: about 400. Rumanian, Bulgarian and Albanian Air Forces combined: some 1,000 planes. Hungarian Air Force strength: not known. (International Aviation, Mar. 13, '58).

CONTINUED NEED FOR MANNED BOMBERS—Manned bombers will have to follow the missiles to the target area in the event of a big war, according to Lt. Gen. C. S. Irvine, USAF Deputy Chief of Staff (Materiel). As a result, the need for bombers won't be reduced for the foreseeable future, he noted.

As USAF sees it, manned bombers are essential for the following reasons: (1) Maps are not yet accurate enough to pinpoint targets for missiles; (2) Many essential targets are moveable; (3) Bombers represent a show of force, like the Sixth Fleet, which give a sense of security to friends and a warning to potential enemies; and (4) Bombers can be called back without firing a shot if need be, something which is impossible with missiles.

In the event of a big war, General Irvine said, it is contempleted that the missiles, when operational, would probably be used first against major targets. The bombers would be used to report and to mop up as needed.

Continuing need for bombers does not mean, however, that quantities to be ordered would be anything like the numbers of, say, B-47s that the Air Force has purchased. First of all, the big manned ships are too expensive and secondly, and perhaps more important, only a few can do the job that took many in World War II because of increased capability and firepower.

SEES CONTINUED NEED FOR INTERCEPTOR—Similarly, Irvine said, no one can write off the importance of the long range interceptor. He pointed out that in all probability an enemy would use a mixed force of aircraft, missiles and decoys and it would be essential to determine as soon as possible what was coming and to knock out those aircraft and missiles which the interceptors could take out as early as possible, leaving those which got through to the anti-missile missiles and other area and point defense weapons.

Here again, while the need will continue to exist, numbers will be substantially smaller, Gen. Irvine said. Aim is, wherever possible, to destroy enemy weapons, whether aircraft or missiles, as far away from potential targets as possible. Emphasis on this need was given by a Naval Admiral, who earlier said that, while enemy missiles might be destroyed above the target at an altitude in excess of 50,000 feet, radiation and fallout would ultimately be a danger to the city being defended. (Aviation Daily, Mar. 12, '58).

BRITISH MISSILE—RAF to receive its first ground-to-air missile, Bristol Bloodhound, in near future. Units will go to RAF Station North Coates for personnel study of operational techniques. Test firings to continue at Woomera, Australia. Bloodhound is a complete weapon system which includes target-illuminating radar equipment, control posts and launchers. System is self-contained—except for need to receive early warning—and is mobile. (International Aviation, Mar. 13, '58).

ATLAS RANGE—Actual range of USAF Atlas ICBM, usually described as 5,000-mile missile, is 5,500 nautical miles or 6,330 statute miles. Payload and strike accuracy of Atlas for this distance described as "greater than required." (Aviation Daily, Mar. 14, '58).

PROTECTION MISSILE—USAF readying bomber defence missile to protect hydrogen bomb-carrying B-52G. Under development by General Electric Co., new bird is air-to-air missile aimed at protecting the big bombers from enemy fighters. (Aviation Daily, Mar. 13, '58).

Netherlands' Prince Bernhard Visits Avro

A T a press conference held in Toronto on the evening of May 6, His Royal Highness Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands was asked by a reporter: "Would you like to fly the Avro Arrow, Your Highness?"

"Certainly I would like to fly the Arrow," the Prince replied, "but I am

afraid it will be impossible."

It was no idle question, and it was not a facetious reply. Prince Bernhard is an experienced pilot whose log book records a creditable amount of jet flying.

On the following day, however, during a visit to Avro Aircraft, the Prince did make a "flight" in the Arrow simulator.

The Royal visit to Avro began in the evening of May 6th with the arrival at Avro's rolling gate of a Dept. of Transport Viscount carrying Prince Bernhard. His Highness was officially welcomed on behalf of the Province of Ontario by Hon. J. Keiller Mackay, Lieutenant Governor, and on behalf of the A. V. Roe Canada Group by Crawford Gordon, President and General Manager.

The following morning, the Prince was greeted in front of Avro's Administration Building by J. L. Plant, President and General Manager, and was officially welcomed to Avro Aircraft.

Dressed informally, Prince Bernhard was then escorted on a tour of the plant by Avro executives, each of whom explained the functions of their respective operations. The escort group included: Fred T. Smye, Executive Vice-President, Aeronautical Division, A. V. Roe Canada Ltd.; J. L. Plant, President and General Manager; J. C. Floyd, Vice-President Engineering; J. A. Morley, Vice-President, Sales and Service; J. Turner, Vice-President Finance; W. H. Riggs, Works Manager; D. H. Rogers, Chief of Flight Operations; and G. Hake, Quality Control and Inspection Manager.

RCAF Pilot Flies Arrow On Eighth Flight

When the first Avro Arrow successfully completed Phase 1 of its flight test program recently, Chief Development Pilot Jan Zurakowski relinquished his place in the cockpit to F/L Jack Woodman, RCAF Test Pilot. F/L Woodman has followed every detail of the flight test program.

As F/L Woodman lifted the Arrow into the air, Zura was not far away. He was pilot of the CF-100 chase plane which followed the Arrow through that part of Jack Woodman's familiarization flight that was within the operating limits of the Mark 5.

Not unfamiliar with Delta airplanes -having nearly 100 hours on USAF F-102—F/L Woodman had no trouble repeating the over-1000-mph performance previously established by Zura.

After he landed, the Arrow was prepared for flight again and Avro's Spud Potocki, the other chase pilot, taxied out and took off. Unfortunately, deteriorating weather cut short the flight.

Interests of the Roe Group now extend from the Atlantic to the Pacific. This is noted in a recent joint announcement by Sir Roy Dobson, Chairman of the Board, and Crawford Gordon, President and General Manager of A. V. Roe Canada that reported:

- Aquisition of Vivian Diesels and Munitions Limited, Vancouver by the Roe Group.
- Aquisition of Vivian Engine Works Limited, Vancouver.
- Formation of Canadian Car (Pacific) Limited, as a subsidiary of Canadian Car of Montreal, to operate the two Vivian Companies on the West Coast.
- Formation of Orenda Industrial Limited as a subsidiary of Orenda Engines Limited.

The announcement points out that acquisitions of the Vivian companies, which were formerly part of the Brush Group, will broaden the base of Can-Car's production and its Western Canada service facilities. Can-Car will also move its Vancouver bus parts depot to Vivian, and at the same time a sales and service depot will be set up for Can-Car's Trailer Division. Orenda Industrial will be associated with the Brush Group of the U.K. which manufactures, among other things, a full line of diesel engines for industrial and marine uses. One of the largest industrial organizations in the U.K., the Brush Group is now part of the Hawker Siddeley Group of which A. V. Roe Canada is also a member.

"Initially, Orenda will market and service Brush products supplied by the U.K. company," adds the statement.

In Canada, Brush installations have been made by most of the uranium mining companies at Blind River, Ont.; by the Federal Government and by the Saskatchewan Power Corporation; and the John Street pumping station and Humber Valley Sewage plant, both at Toronto; and many others.

E. K. Brownridge, Executive Vice-President and General Manager of Orenda Engines Limited, has been appointed President of Orenda Industries Limited.

With this stark introduction, Montserrat, adapted for the stage by Lillian Hellman, unfolds with the tautness of a cross-bow and achieves moments of classic tragedy in the grand Hamletian manner. Although based on incidents in 19th Century South America, the play offers speculative comparison to the present situation in Cuba.

John Carroll, clerk, Material Assessment, portrays Salas Ina in this Producer's Playhouse presentation but lauds William Brydon, 25-year-old boy wonder of Toronto Theatre, for his "incredible poetry and power" in the title role. Montserrat is under the direction of Sean Mulchay, winner of the 1957 Bessborough Trophy, and runs onward from May 16th.

Jot this one down as a must. Place: Producer's Playhouse, 55 Dundas Street E., Toronto. Curtain: 8.20. Excellent parking facilities, advises John.

Those of you who took our tip and attended the Weston Little Theatre production of Book Of The Month are undoubtedly still chuckling in retrospect over this delightful rib-tickler.

Directed by Lionel Levy, Aeroelastics, "Book" ran as smooth as a calm sea but erupted into passages that were idiotically funny.

Heroine Bim Halliday writes a "best seller" but draws generously from the lives of her parents, aunt, the local doctor and a neighbouring Colonel. When said personnel read the novel and discover some of the alleged "carryings on" of participants, pure chaos reigns in a happy mixture of farce and mischief.

TV TATTLE: Avro's Industrial Relations Division will find the CBC's new documentary series, World In Action, of special interest. "The Clerk", part one of a six-part format which examines mankind within the Industrial framework, hit the video lanes last week. Thought the debut of three one-act plays by Tennessee Williams-highlighted by "Moony's Kid Don't Cry" with Ben Gazzara—just about the best viewing of the current season.

RECORD TALK: Hector Vila-Lobos' "Discovery of Brazil" suite is worthy of attention. Mark it as a modern classic. Extremely inventive and provocative in style and composition. And a re-hear of Dvorak's "New World Symphony" with its various Indian motifs and delightful melodies still makes the best of a rainy Saturday.

Jazz-Wise, your best bet is a LP called "The Fabulous Bill Holman" with Conti Condoli on trumpet and Ray Sims on trombone. Holman's work flows nicely with several lines going at the same time and he builds his charts with a mathematical precision to some fairly exciting climaxes.
