

Composer Of Levelhead Was Interceptor Pilot

The job of the all-weather interceptor crews who are assigned the responsibility of identifying the first enemy intruder to approach North America is not a "picnic". CF-100 squadrons of RCAF Air Defence Command and their counterparts in the USAF are on 24-hour alert. All unidentified aircraft flying over this continent must be identified — whether they strayed from a prescribed flight path, got airborne without the formality of a flight plan or are on course before their flight plan is broadcast.

It is a routine job, and must be done at any time — in any weather.

Levelhead and the Night is a first hand impression of an interception to identify. The composer of this blank verse, 2nd Lieut. Mark Richard Polking, USAF was an all-weather fighter pilot in Air Defence Command, flying F-86Ds out of McGuire AFB, N.J. Like some other gifted pilots, Lt. Polking hoped to combine writing and flying. He planned to return to the University of Michigan after his term of USAF active duty to complete his academic degree. Lt. Polking died at the age of 22 in the crash of his F-86D after its jet engine flamed out on a GCA approach to McGuire. He was returning from a scramble after unidentified targets similar to the mission of "Levelhead".

Make Final Delivery Of Belgian CF-100's

Delivery of the fourth and final group of the 53 Avro CF-100 all-weather jet interceptors being provided to the Belgian Air Force under joint Canadian-U.S.A. mutual aid arrangements, was slated to begin this week, it had been announced by Air Force Headquarters.

Take off from RCAF Station Uplands was scheduled for "Operation Jump Moat 4", with RCAF aircrews ferrying the 11 remaining long-range jets across the north-Atlantic to Beauvechain, Belgium, by way of Goose Bay, Labrador and Keflavik, Iceland. In addition, six CF-100s for NATO duty with the RCAF's overseas-based air division will accompany the Belgium-bound jets and proceed to 3 Fighter Wing, Zweibrucken, Germany.

Under the command of Squadron Leader Robert J. Clark, CD, 35, of Saskatoon, Sask., a flight commander with 410 All-Weather Squadron at Uplands, the aircraft will be flown along the same air-route that was used during the three previous Jump Moat operations last December, March and June, when 42 of the long-range interceptors were ferried to Belgium.

Flying support for the CF-100s during the trans-Atlantic hop to Belgium will be provided by the RCAF's Air Transport Command.

For the convenience of the parents and spectators, bleacher seating is being arranged parallel to the race area.


The plant nursing staff will be centrally located to administer to the usual cuts, scratches, scrapes and bumps, during the entire day.

Malton Airport In Jet Age To Have Unfamiliar Features

New Aeroquays Will Facilitate Loading

WHEN ground is broken later this year about a mile southeast of the present Malton Airport terminal building, Avro will be seeing the start by the Department of Transport of what the Department considers will be the most advanced airport terminal building in the world.

Designed to cater to the jet age of transportation, it will break away from traditional approaches to airport design and incorporate the use of satellite "aeroquays" or island "gate positions" surrounding a main central building.

The plan, developed jointly by DoT architects and the Toronto consulting architectural firm of J. B. Parkins Associates, has been keyed to two major considerations: maximum convenience for passengers and maximum efficiency for handling airlines' aircraft.

Provision has been made for handling jet aircraft carrying up to 200 passengers which are scheduled to come into service by 1960.

The new terminal will consist of a central building housing administrative and operational offices and four satellite circular structures or aeroquays at which the aircraft will load and unload their passengers and cargoes. The initial stage of the project, which will cost approximately \$20,000,-000 will consist of the central building and two of the aeroquays. The additional aeroquays will be added later as the traffic demand warrants.

While the aeroquay, as such, is not first (DoT's multi-million dollar terminal building, now in an advanced stage, at Montreal Airport will have it) the Toronto Airport plan is unique in that passengers will be able to drive their cars to within 100 feet of the aircraft they will board, and in addition, leave them in a multi-storey parking structure overhead.

The roof of these aeroquay buildings will be fitted as heliports from which helicopters will provide rapid transportation to and from downtown Toronto and other surrounding centres.

Entrance to the airport will be from an overpass on the Malton road which is being developed into a four-lane highway. Cars will pass under the aircraft apron onto a sunken area around the main administration building. In front of this building a pedestrian plaza and formal gardens will provide a pleasing approach from the aircraft apron where visiting dignitaries will deplane.

Underpasses from this sunken area will lead to each of the aeroquays. These will be circular self-contained buildings from which many aircraft could be loaded and unloaded simultaneously. Passengers will enplane by means of covered walkways on ramp levels. Plans, however, provide for the use of aerobridge loading in the future when passengers will be able to enplane from second-floor gates to the level of aircraft entrances. The aeroquay buildings will be shielded from the blast of jet-powered aircraft.


As vehicles emerge from the underpass which leads from the Administration Building area to one of the aeroquays, they will arrive at the entrance to the ticket lobby which will be equipped for speeding ticketing operations and for the handling of baggage. From the main entrance, cars may be driven to the adjoining parking area or driven up a ramp into the







First Spares Shipment Delivered In Belgium

The first shipment of maintenance spares to be sent by Avro to the Belgian Air Force was unloaded recently at the port of Antwerp in Belgium.

Fourteen tons of CF-100 Mk. 5 spares had been loaded aboard the Swedish-American liner S.S. Carlsholm in Toronto harbour. About three weeks later, at Antwerp docks, the ship was met by Jim Kenny, Vice President and General Manager of Avro Aircraft Services Ltd.; Bill Wilkins and Roy Ellard, Avro service representatives to the Belgian Air Force, and Reg Cooper, Orenda Engines service representative to the B.A.F.

Immediately after unloading, the spares, the first of a series of shipments, were sent to the Belgian Air Force supply depot at Zellik.

New Temporary Badges To Appear Next Week

On Wednesday, July 2, a new form of badge will be seen around the plant and offices of the Company. It will be bright red in colour and will be date stamped with the date of issue.

This badge will not be enclosed in familiar plastic cases and does not have a pin but is of light cardboard which has, on the back, a new type of adhesive designed for sticking to any type of cloth without damaging or marking the material to which it is applied.

The new badge will be issued by the Plant Protection Corps to employees who have forgotten their regular identification badge. It will only be valid on the date of issue and is to be turned in to the Plant Protection Officer at the gate when leaving the plant. The badge should always be worn in a prominent place.
