Flying Icemen

During the past several weeks, three Lancaster 10MR's from the RCAF's Maritime Air Command have been operating from Resolute, in the Far Arctic, flying ice reconnaissance patrols.

The detachment of Lancasters, under command of Squadron Leader W. S. Day, DFC, is from 405 Maritime Squadron and is providing ice information to DoT vessels engaged in the annual sea re-supply of the joint Arctic weather stations. Normally, 405 is based at Greenwood, N.S. The operation, which started in mid-July and is now nearly ended, has been tabbed "Operation Far Cry."

Previously the job of taking in supplies by sea had been undertaken almost entirely by the U.S. Navy, but this year the DoT is performing the major role in the operation. Departmental vessels involved include the icebreakers "D'Iberville", and "N. B. McLean," and the supply vessel "C. D.

In addition to their ice reconnaissance duties, the crews of the three Lancasters are observing and reporting on musk-oxen sighted during these flights.

New AOC for ATC

Air Commodore Henry M. Carscallen, DFC, has succeeded Group Captain Z. L. Leigh, OBE, as AOC, Air Transport Command, Lachine, P.Q.

G/C Leigh has been acting AOC since Air Commodore Robert C. Ripley, the former AOC, was appointed to the staff of Allied Air Forces Central Europe in December of last year.

In 1945, A/C Carscallen was attached as an observer to the USAF at Guam in the Pacific. While serving in this capacity he participated in the last bombing raid of the war, an attack by B-29's on Japan the morning of VJ

Since the war, he has held a number of staff positions and prior to attending National Defence College recently, he was Chief of Air Operations at AFHQ.
