-NAMES IN THE NEWS

Equadron Leader Keith R. Greenaway, a member of the RCAF and one of the world's leading authorities on aerial navigation, has been named the winner of the McKee Trans-Canada Trophy for 1952.

S/L Greenaway, 37, a native of Woodville, Ontario, received the award for his work in his chosen field. Arctic aerial navigation is his specialty and last year his study and development activities in this line culminated in the perfection by him, in collaboration with James Cox of the Defense Research Board, of the High Altitude Twilight Computor, a navigation and now adopted by both the RCAF and RAF for northern flying operations.

The McKee Trophy is not the first honor to come to S/L Greenaway. Last year he was awarded the Thurlow Award for an outstanding contribution to the science of navigation.

In addition, he received an award from the Royal Meteorological Society for a paper on Arctic weather conditions, which was acclaimed as outstanding in its treatment of a complex subject. He is also the author of a navigation text which is recognized as a standard and authoritative work by both the RCAF and the USAF. The book, "Arctic Air Navigation" was edited by Miss Moira Dunbar, a scientist and associate of the McKee Trophy winner at the Defense Research Board.

S/L Greenaway joined the RCAF in 1940 and an early interest in radio and electronics made it natural for him to become an instructor in these subjects. He later remustered as a navigator, gaining his wings with top honors. He has since been an active navigator on flights all over the world and was the navigator on the first military aircraft to fly over the North Pole. At that time, 1946, he was attached to the USAF.

He is now attached to the Defense Research Board, specializing in his pet subject—Arctic aerial navigation.

Frank L. Trethewey, a well-known figure in aviation in Canada, has joined Avro Canada's Sales & Service Division as Ottawa Representative. Mr. Trethewey, who will report directly to J. A. Morley, Avro Canada Director of Sales, has temporary office quarters at

He was born in Vancouver and attended Ridley College. He served with the RNAS from 1914 to 1918 and with the RCAF from 1939 to 1945, retiring with the rank of Group Captain. He was closely associated with The de Havilland Aircraft of Canada in its early days. In 1948 he became consultant to the Canadian Commercial Corporation for Aircraft Production. He was later placed in charge of aircraft contracts, which he continued to

administer when the Department of Defense Production was created. When he resigned from the DDP in the spring of 1952, he was Assistant Director of the Aircraft Division i/c Contracts.

Air Marshal W. A. Curtis, recently retired RCAF Chief of the Air Staff, has been elected vice-chairman of the Board of Directors of Avro Canada, it has been announced by Sir Roy Dobson, chairman of the Board, and founder of the company.

In making the announcement, Sir Roy said: "It is most appropriate that Air Marshal Curtis, after an outstanding military career, should be resuming his business career with our company. This unit was based on the HMCS Warrior, the first carrier to be loaned by the RN to the RCN. Leaving the RCN in February 1947, he immediately joined Avro Canada's Gas Turbine Division, in which he has held a variety of posts. At present, Mr. Britton is Senior Installations Engineer in the Division.

Ronald Peel, who was recently named supervisor of ground training for TCA, was, at the time of his new appointment, chief navigator for the air line. He will be responsible for initial training of TCA's new first officers and the new equipment conversion of veteran pilots.


