Paul Y. Davoud, previously a director and vice president of Orenda Engines Ltd., has been appointed to the position of chairman of the Air Transport Board. An outstanding figure in aviation, Mr. Davoud came out of World War II as a Group Captain with the DSO, OBE and DFC. Prior to the war, he had been active in northern Manitoba as a bush pilot. After the war, he joined TCA. He left TCA to organize an executive air transport service for E. P. Taylor and associates; later he went to Field Aviation before going with Orenda. Mr. Davoud has been a director of the AITA since 1953, and was a vice president of the organization in 1956-57.
