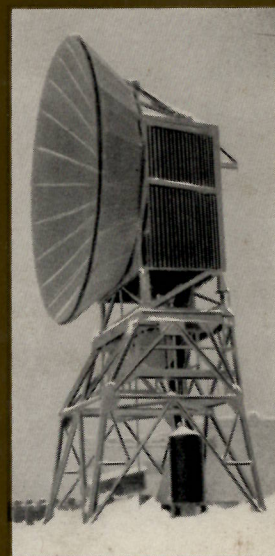

The death of Dag Hammerskjold has raised many serious questions about the future of the United Nations, already under attack by Mr. Khrushchev and mired in the morass of the Congo. Swelled by dozens of new members, it is now a quite different organization than it was only a few years ago. Here, in a book combining reason and eloquence, Ernest A. Gross takes a statesman's look at the world organization, what it was intended to be, what it has become, what is its promise for the future. His main concern is United States policy and how we, through the U.N., can further both our own security and the cause of peace.

Mr. Gross has served as Legal Adviser and Assistant Secretary in the Department of State and as Deputy U.S. Representative to the United Nations with the rank of Ambassador. Since leaving those official posts, he has continued to be closely associated with the work of the Organization.
