Two Avroites' Sons Are Scholarship Winners

Avro's Scholarship Committee has announced the 1958 winners of the Avro Aircraft Employees' Son Scholarships.

One is Richard Aylesworth, son of Arthur B. Aylesworth, Engineering Equipment Design Dept., who intends to take the Mathematics and Physics Course at University of Toronto.

The other is Bill Bialkowski, son of L. S. Bialkowski, Engineering Equipment Design Dept., who plans to take electrical engineering at U. of T.

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THE WORLD AROUND US

JET TRANSPORT DELIVERY—Pan American World Airways takes delivery of first Boeing 707 jet Stratoliner some months ahead of schedule. Pan-Am., first line to buy American-built jets, placed order 36 months ago—scheduled jet service to start early next year. Faster delivery means service may start in November. Ten 707s have already rolled out, nine more on final assembly. Nearly 150 KC-135 jet Stratotankers have rolled from Boeing's Renton plant. Boeing received a provisional type certificate for 707-120 series transports—first ever issued by CAA. Full certification expected soon. Provisional ticket allows training, route-proving and other non-revenue operations. (Aviation Daily, Aug. 14, 19, 20, 1958.)

COMET RECORD—After completing Port of New York Authority noise tests at Idlewild, a DeHavilland Comet IV jet airliner set a New York-London commercial aircraft record for the run. Flying 3,496 miles in 6 hrs., 27 min., Comet averaged 537.8 mph—cut one hour, 17 minutes off mark set in January by Britannia turboprop. (Aviation Daily, Aug. 13, 1958.)

CANADAIR IN BRAZIL—Canadair has firm plans to build its model 540 (Napier-Eland-6 turboprop version of Convair 440) at new plant to be constructed near Sao Paulo, Brazil. Canadair and Convair are both General Dynamics subsidiaries. Canadair has order for 10 aircraft—tagged CL-66—for RCAF, but reports indicate reasonable assurance of \$100-million order for 90 planes in Brazil. If consummated, program will mark building of Canadair's first foreign facility and will be first time a major aircraft plant is constructed in South America. Canadair's Brazilian program calls for plant employing nearly 3,500 workers. (Aviation Daily, Aug. 13, 1958.)


\$250-MILLION AIRLINER—In full-page newspaper ads., Douglas Aircraft Co. emphasizes its \$250-million investment in developing the DC-8 jet airliner program. Ads state that although DC-8 has valuable potential as jet military aircraft, it was not developed on government order. Ads further point out that DC-8 program "represents the largest aircraft investment by private enterprise ever undertaken, if not, indeed, the largest single investment ever made in a new product." (Aviation Daily, Aug. 20, 1958.)

STARFIGHTER MODS—About eight items involved in temporary grounding of USAF F-104 Starfighters. Modifications include: improved fuel control, some change to the inlet guide vane port filter, manual override switch for rack reset, additional manual override switch for nozzle area, ruggedized version of Red Bank amplifier and modified high-pressure lubefilter. Not all were problem areas, but all mods will be done at same time. (Aviation Daily, Aug. 15, 1958.)

CANADIAN AIRCRAFT INDUSTRY SURVEY—Factory value of shipments by Canada's aircraft and parts industry in 1957 amounted to \$424,443,000, according to preliminary industry survey by DBS. Figure represents about 20% increase on previous year's \$354,510,000 production. Last year industry employed 41,616 persons who earned \$179,699,000 compared with 35,563 persons in 1956 earning \$146,428,000. Aircraft and parts builders spent \$148,547,000 on materials and supplies in 1957 compared with \$138,156,000 in 1956. (Aviation Daily, August 15, 1958.)

SUB-KILLER COSTS—Defence Production Minister O'Hurley discloses in statement that 33 Canadair Argus sub-killer aircraft will cost at least \$169 million—about \$5,000,000 each. This price, revealed for first time, includes cost of engineering and development of Argus from basic Britannia airframe, as well as tooling, production and spares. It does not include much of plane's expensive electronic gear or any of its armament which consists mainly of homing torpedoes. (Aviation Daily, Aug. 11, 1958.)

ACCELERATE B-70 PROGRAM—Look for real acceleration of B-70 chemical bomber program. How fast this Mach 3 aircraft can be produced depends largely on ability to push development of GE J93 engines and materials capable of withstanding 1600° F temperatures. J93 engine will not be dual-cycle jet, but afterburner of end product may be used as ramjet. Expected to start tests soon, engine will use JP-4 fuel initially, probably will graduate to a hydrocarbon fuel rather than chemicals. Best bet on external skin construction of B-70—barring new materials breakthrough—is stainless steel sandwich. Skin will be Allegheny AM-380 or Armco 17-7H with stainless steel core bonded by silver-magnesium braze. Such sections now used on parts of Hustler. (Aviation Daily, Aug. 10, 1958.)

Vulcans Span Atlantic, Non-Stop U.K. To Malton

Thousands of people packing the Canadian National Exhibition waterfront last Friday saw world aviation history made over Toronto when a giant Avro Vulcan bomber flew past

on schedule during the Canadian International Air Show. The four-jet delta of Royal Air Force Bomber Command was seen at two air shows, 3,570 miles apart on both sides of the Atlantic, on one flight and on the same day.

Taking off from the 1958 SBAC Air Show at Farnborough, England, at 2.50 p.m. British summer time, it flew over the air show in Toronto 6½ hours later (4.30 pm Toronto time). The record-breaking Vulcan was piloted by S/L Donald Skeen.


This aircraft was one of two belonging to No. 101 Squadron at Royal Air Force Station, Finningley, Yorkshire, which landed at Malton last Friday. The second Vulcan, captained by F/L Walter "Paddy" Green, AFC, flew to Goose Bay, Labrador, the day before, and came on to Malton after S/L Skeen's Vulcan had landed. This second aircraft took off for the UK at 3.45 am Sunday, carrying a message to A. M. Burke, President of the SBAC Show from Frank Young, President of the Canadian International Air Show.

Flight Lieutenant Green radioed his position from time to time during his direct flight Toronto-Farnborough and these messages were passed by the loud speaker system to the crowds at Farnborough.

Avro Aircraft serviced the Vulcans as well as other jet aircraft taking part in the show. So big is the Vulcan, however, that Avro has had to tear (Continued on Page 5)

Zura and Jack Woodman Check Over Silver Dart

Two well known figures from Avro turned up at the Armed Forces display at the CNE last week on a bit of a "bussman's tour". Jan Zurakowski, Chief Development Pilot and F/L Jack Woodman, RCAF test pilot — two of Canada's fastest airmen—took time out for a detailed inspection of the operating characteristics of Canada's first airplane, the Silver Dart.

The one on display at the "Ex" is a replica since the original Silver Dart was destroyed while undergoing flight trials, but Silver Dart II, like the second ship Mayflower, will soon reenact a bit of history. The plane will be shipped to Baddeck, N.S., for its first flight on Feb. 23 exactly 50 years to the day and from the same spot that the original Silver Dart soared into the air.

The aircraft and its appearance at the CNE was to make Canadians aware that the Golden Anniversary of flight in Canada is to be celebrated all next year.

The plan to obtain original blueprints of the aircraft from the Alexander Graham Bell Museum at Baddeck was conceived by LAC Lionel McCaffrey, of Calgary, stationed at the Trenton air base. He and LAC Carson Smith, of Toronto, and LAC Mickey Trimm, of Liverpool, N.S., set in to work on the project more than two years ago at Trenton.

Its first pilot was J. A. D. McCurdy, now the former lieutenant-governor of Nova Scotia.

The flimsy craft is powered by a 50-horsepower Curtiss engine and could be easily out-distanced by a sea gull any day.

down part of the fencing at the rolling gate to allow the Vulcans into the flight test line. They have a 99-foot span and are 97 feet long.

Originally known as the Avro 698, the Vulcan is the first operational delta-wing bomber in the world. Its first flight, on 30 August 1952, marked the climax of many years' intensive pioneer research by Avro into deltawing aircraft. It is now in service with the RAF.

Handling qualities are good at both low and high speeds. The approach and landing techniques are particularly simple. The landing attitude is normal and approach speeds may be selected over a wide range. Near-sonic cruising speeds are readily achieved and the absence of tailplane, flaps, slots and high-lift devices all contribute to making life less complicated for the pilot. All servicing is carried out from underneath the aircraft.

The Vulcan's development potential is one of its most attractive characteristics and the leading edge of its wing was re-designed to take even more powerful engines available soon.

THEATRE: A number of Avroites who read this column in the last issue of Newsmagazine have asked this reviewer to comment upon his most bizarre or unusual evening at the theatre during his recent trip to the United Kingdom. This, he would be most happy to do.

The Chairs and The Lesson, two one-act plays by the controversial European playwright, Donesco, have been revived at the Royal Court Theatre in Chelsea about eight times during the past year. This will give some indication as to their popularity.

It is truly a wonder how such plays as these could ever claim such a persistent and enthusiastic adulation.

The Chairs for example, is madder than a hatter and possesses ten times the inscrutability of any Easter Island Monolith. The Lesson, puts its audience into the proverbial straight-jacket almost as soon as the curtain goes up.

In The Chairs, a 100-year-old man and wife await the arrival of a group of guests in their large attic living quarters. The old man is going to convey to these guests, by way of an orator who will read the old man's message from a roll of parchment, the very secret of life itself-the final answer about Mankind and his destiny in a fathomless universe.

The guests arrive one by one—they are all invisible, by the way,—and the old couple bring out chairs for the meet-

But as the play progresses, the invisible guests arrive faster and faster, until finally the stage is a bedlam of empty chairs—hundreds of them. And all the while the old man and woman dash about like pixilated ghouls pushing chairs into place and shaking hands and chatting merrily with the arriving phantoms.


Finally, when the orator arrives (he is the only other live person in the show) the old couple bid adieu to their long lives and commit suicide backwards out of respective win-

The orator bows amiably to the guests and unrolls the mystical parchment. The audience is tense. You can hear a pin drop. What will be these words of wisdom summing up the meaning of life and the destiny of Man? We await the magic voice of the orator with bated breath.


