

However, after World War II a new threat loomed on the horizon, and air defence again became a reality. In 1948, No. 1 Air Defence Group

Headquarters was formed and this formation has remained, in various forms, to this day. After 49 years, 1997 signals an end to a dedicated Canadian command for the air defence to Canada. This year welcomes No. 1 Canadian Air Division back, and they will carry the air defence torch. This book is about the air defence organization and all the units, bases, stations and squadrons, created to defend Canada against air attack.
