Dorval Busiest

Vancouver's International Airport has lost the role of Canada's busiest airfield according to DoT statistics for 1955. Montreal's Dorval has taken first place with a total of 220,542 landings and take-offs during the year. This was a jump from fourth spot in 1954, while Vancouver has fallen to third with 180,689, surpassed by Edmonton with 181,581.

Toronto's Malton Airport dropped from third to fourth place with 179,-815 which is actually an increase of 17.281 landings and take-offs for the year.

Scheduled air line landings and takeoffs, included in the above figures, were as follows: Montreal, 43,359; Malton, 41,846; Vancouver, 30,062; Edmonton, 23,397. The compilation for 23 main airports showed an overall increase of 12.2% with a total of 1,-900,810 aircraft movements.

Come and Get It

Canadian aircraft manufacturers and distributors have been asked to supply a static display of their wares at the forthcoming mass breakfast flight scheduled for Sunday, June 17, sponsored by the Ontario County Flying Club, Oshawa.

This will be the second mass flight sponsored by the Oshawa group. A total of 103 aircraft and 216 visitors attended the July 1947 flight. An open invitation has been extended to flyers and flying clubs. The aircraft are scheduled to arrive between 7:30 and 9:30 in the morning.

Test Pilot Topics

Chief test pilots of the military services and Canada's major aircraft companies met in the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, to take preliminary action toward the formation of an association of test pilots. The meeting was a direct follow-up from a gathering in Ottawa in which more than 50 military and civilian test pilots from the Maritimes to the West Coast gathered to discuss phases of the projected organization.

The Toronto meeting functioned as a steering committee and concentrated on a discussion of proposed articles of the new association and selection of names for a first slate of officers. The projected association will strive for a broadening of professional relationships among members; provide a medium for discussion of newly developed phenomena in the realm of test (lying for mutual benefit; exchange of general information for mutual development of test techniques; discussion of the advancement of flight safety; technical advancement by provisions of education through lectures, displays and presentations; and other related matters of particular interest to Canadian pilots engaged in the testing of modern experimental and production aircraft.
