-NAMES IN THE NEWS

Thirty-eight-year-old Dr. William A. Prowse has been named to succeed Dr. H. E. Wilson as head of the civil aviation medicine division of the Department of National Health & Welfare. Dr. Wilson resigned recently to enter private practice.

As chief of civil aviation medicine, Dr. Prowse will work closely with the DoT in developing and maintaining medical standards for pilots and other persons working in civil aviation and will advise on the medical aspects of all problems connected with the health of travellers by air. He will also be responsible for maintaining regulations regarding the medical aspects of flight which affect the safety, comfort, and health of persons working in civil aviation.

Dr. Prowse was a medical officer with the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps from 1943 to 1946 and for the past five years has been a medical officer with the RCAF. He is a graduate of medicine from Queen's University, Kingston, and in public health from the University of Toronto.

John H. Parkin, CBE, director of the National Aeronautical Establishment, has been awarded the University of Toronto Engineering Alumni Association's Alumni Medal in recognition of his contribution to the advancement of aviation and aeronautical science in Canada. The Medal represents the highest honor the Association has the power to bestow and is awarded every three years to a graduate of the University of Toronto School of Practical Science of more than 25 years' standing (as well as the one more recent graduate). The awards are granted for outstanding contribution to Canadian science & industry.

A graduate of the University of Toronto in 1912, Mr. Parkin was a professor there when he constructed Canada's first experimental wind tunnel in 1917. The citation with the Alumni Medal states he pioneered Canada's basic aerodynamic research. He spent twelve years, 1917-29, developing the University of Toronto course in aerodynamics before being appointed to the National Research Council. In 1937 he became director of the NRC's Division of Mechanical Engineering, and

was recently appointed to his present post. Mr. Parkin also holds the Czowski Medal of the Engineering Institute of Canada and was awarded the CBE in 1946.

Crawford Gordon, Jr., who took up his duties as president & general manager of Avro Canada on October 15, was born in Winnipeg in 1912 and was educated at Appleby College at Oakville, Ont., and McGill University where he received a Bachelor of Commerce degree.

During World War II, from 1941 to 1945, Mr. Gordon was on loan to the Department of Munitions & Supply where he was director-general of organization and assistant co-ordinator of production. He continued with the postwar Department of Reconstruction & Supply as director-general of industrial conversion and in 1946 was awarded the OBE for his services. As co-ordinator of production for the recently created Department of Defence
