Arrow Program Is RISHED BY AVRO AIRCRAFT LIMITED, MALTON, ONTARIO JANUARY 17, 1958 Arrow Program Is Tremendous Credit To Canada — Plant

'Probably the biggest single program ever undertaken by Canada, if carried through completely to operational squadrons," was the comment on the Avro Arrow project given by J. L. Plant, Executive Vice-President and General Manager, at a recent Press Conference. The gathering of Newspaper, Television and Radio News Writers, Magazine and News Services' representatives was held at Avro

for an informal discussion of some of the technical aspects of the Arrow development program in the light of continuous enquiries from news centers concerning

Particular interest has been shown in the enquiries as to the probable date of the first flight. This point has been of special concern to news photographic

In that a definite answer is impractical because of the very nature of a comprehensive testflight program it was decided to invite the news writers to an informal explanatory briefing by the General Manager.

High-Speed Taxi Trials

Mr. Plant told the gathering that the aircraft is now in experimental hangar having undergone its low-speed taxi trials. "It will be coming out of the hangar within the next two or three weeks", he said, pointing out that Arrow 1 will then "do its

high speed taxi trials, following each one of which it will be given the same inspection as between flight inspection and on any one of those high speed trials, the airplane will fly.

The General Manager advised the writers and commentators that for these reasons, as well as the need for complete lack of confusion from visitors not directly related to the crucial first flight, it would be inadvisable to attempt any form of a programmed press attendance.

Defines Weapons System

In a question-and-answer period that followed, Mr. Plant made the following remarks in response to queries:

"... Arrow 1 is the initial test vehicle for the overall aerodynamic characteristics of the airplane as an airplane. When we get the Arrow 2, we start getting the complete weapon. It must be borne in mind that we are talking not about an airplane so much as a weapon, and the whole thing is designed around the weapons system concept. There are four major parts to this weapon; there is the actual missile, the guidance system for the missile and the navigation and flying control equipment, the airframe and the engines. So there are really four major parts that have to be integrated into this piece of hardware before it can be considered as a weapon.'

". . . It will be a tremendous credit to Canada when this programme proves itself to be suc-

"... The first flight would likely take the form that Jan Zurakowski, Chief Experimental Test Pilot, would take off and climb up to about five or ten thousand feet, raise the undercarriage, go up to about fifteen thousand feet, fly it around below Mach 1, test the controls, come down to eight or ten thousand feet, lower the undercarriage and fly at low speed, test the controls near the stall to get a good feel of the airplane on its final approach and

John Frost continues in his position as Chief Design Engineer, Special Projects, and will be responsible for the engineering section of the Group.



Gordon Kells continues as Experimental Superintendent, Special Projects, reporting directly to the Experimental Manager.








