• Edward B. Bragg, chief production engineer for Avro Aircraft Ltd. from 1952 to 1960, died in April of a heart attack in Cambridge, Mass., where he had been working. Mr. Bragg had only recently accepted the position of chief manufacturing manager of Elliott Industries, Cambridge. He was 41 years old.

Born in Ann Arbor, Michigan, Mr. Bragg studied engineering at the U. of Michigan. He was an aircraft engineer with Kaiser-Fraser Corp. before joining Avro.

• Charles S. Banting, 63, a former B.C. bush pilot and airline engineer, has died following a two-month illness.

Born in Cookstown, Ont., he began

his aviation career with the Royal Flying Corps during World War I. He became an aircraft engineer because he was too young to fly at the time.

After the war he worked for airlines on the prairies, flying as a bush pilot out of Prince Albert, Sask., between 1930 and 1940.

He stopped flying and moved to Edmonton in 1940 to become engineering supervisor for Canadian Pacific Airlines. In 1945 he came to Vancouver to join Queen Charlotte Airlines in the same capacity.

o Donald H. Rogers, formerly chief of flight operations for Avro Aircraft Ltd., now heads up the company's marine division as manager. Don Rogers, who has been flying since 1935, began his test flying career with National Steel Car Corp., which later became Victory Aircraft Corp. In 1942 he became assistant chief test pilot for Victory Aircraft. In 1945, when Victory was taken over by A. V. Roe Canada Ltd., he became chief test pilot, then, in 1955, flight operations manager and, latterly, chief of flight operations.

Mr. Rogers was responsible for practically all the test flying of the Jetliner and much of that for the CF-100. He has logged over 5,500 hours on some 20 different types of aircraft.

• B. A. Chalmers, a former director and vice president of Bristol's three Canadian subsidiary facilities in Montreal, Winnipeg, and Vancouver, has been appointed secretary of Bristol Aircraft Ltd., a member of the British Aircraft Corp.

Mr. Chalmers joined the Bristol organization in Canada in 1954 as executive assistant to the president, and was appointed secretary in the same year. In 1956 he became a director and vice president of Bristol's three Canadian subsidiaries. Since 1958 he has been president of The Bristol Aeroplane Co. of Canada Ltd's Mexican and Cuban subsidiaries and a vice president (Latin American) of that same company.
