Deny Arrow Led to Simonds Quitting Army

Ottawa, March 1—In informed quarters here it is flatly
denied that the former Liberal
government's continuance of
the Arrow program was a factor
in the retirement of Lt.-Gen.
Guy G. Simonds as chief of
staff in 1955.

Gen. Simonds' statement, made in Toronto Friday night, was branded as a post factorationalization of the position in which he found himself when he had completed his tour of duty as chief of staff.

An alternative course open to the Government at that time, it is said, would have been to promote him to the chairman-ship of the chiefs of staff committee, a post held then and now by Gen. Charles Foulkes.

Apart from the fact that personal relations between Gen. Simonds and Gen. Foulkes had been somewhat strained, the Government is said to have had no desire to end Gen. Foulkes' service.

It is also observed that Gen. Simonds had the reputation of being first and last an army man who invariably opposed appropriations for any fighting service other than his own. The Arrow development was, of course, an RCAF program.

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
