Reagan In Gulfport see two

The city of Gulfport launched its Bicentennial Celebration on Sunday, January 11th, with a Citizens Parade and Bicentennial

Participating in the parade were: Gulfport Police cruisers, Gulfport Fire Department trucks, American Legion Color Guard, Mayor and Councilman's car, Miss Gulfport's car, GEMS bus with City Department Heads, Air Force Guard, Civil Air Patrol, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, National Guard, Boca Ciega High School Band, Coterie Club, Coast Guard Color Guard, Citizens walking, Shuffleboard Club, Town shores Chorus aboard bus, Fire Department van, Cars -Bikes - cycles, Horses, and bringing up the rear, a police cruiser.

The Citizens Parade, which is seen in pictures throughout this issue, was followed by a gathering of an estimated 600 persons at the Kick-Off program, directed by Councilwoman Yvonne Johnson, Bicentennial Chairman.

Guests were welcomed by Mrs. Johnson. Invocation was given by Rev. Robert F. Martin, Gulfport Presbyterian Church.

After the introduction of city officials, elected, appointed and department heads, Miss Patrice Pucci, Director of Pinellas County Bicentennial Office, presented Mayor Jay P. Clymer with a framed certificate designating the City of Gulfport as an official National Bicentennial Community. Before such a designation is made, a community must submit plans for the bicentennial year's activities, which must cover three areas -Festival, Heritage and Horizons. As Chairman of the Bicentennial Committee, Councilwoman Johnson presented the City of Gulfport with a "Four Freedoms Coin Collection" which is on display in the Gulfport Public Library. Norma Lamb, Library Director, and Kay Baker, President of Friends of the Library, accepted the four-piece collection.

Each piece has a reproduction of one of Norman Rockwell's famous Four Freedoms paintings. Freedom From Want is with the silver standard collection, Freedom of Worship is with the Lincoln Memorial collection of pennies, Freedom of Speech is with the 20th Century collection of various coins, and Freedom of Fear is with the collection of wartime coinage. The collection is housed in a beautifully constructed display case which was built in the City's shop.

An explanation of the famous bell was given, telling where it was made, when it cracked, when it was re-cast, and when it cracked again. 
