

Marguerite Horne Spaulding Marries W. Sherrod McCall

A late afternoon hour, 5:30 o'clock, was chosen for the quiet home wedding of Marguerite Horne Spaulding and William Sherrod McCall, yesterday at the bride's home, 5705 Tangerine avenue.

The double ring ceremony was performed by the Rev. Dr. Archibald G. Sinclair, in the long living room where bowls of roses graced every table. The immediate family and a few friends gathered to witness the ceremony.

The bride's only attendant was her mother, Mrs. J. A. Horne. Peter Morse Spaulding was the bridegroom's best man.

For the ceremony the bride chose an afternoon gown of pastel yellow embroidered marquisette, with white accessories, including an heirloom handkerchief with deep border of rose point lace. In her hair was a gardenia, and on her arm she carried a large bouquet of blush roses and pale yellow gerbera.

Mrs. Horn wore a gown of white, the bodice embroidered with appliqued motifs, and her corsage was of a single purple orchid.

Following the ceremony an informal reception was held, and

a buffet supper served to the guests after the cutting of the towering, decorated wedding cake by the bride and groom.

Mr. and Mrs. McCall will leave on a trip to the northern part of the state and on their return will reside at 5705 Tangerine avenue.

Mrs. McCall is the daughter of the late Dr. Joseph Allen and Mrs. Horne. She is a native of Pennsylvania and received her early education in Germantown. Since coming to St. Petersburg to live she has been active in musical and art groups. She was chairman for the Fine Arts center for service men during the time the Army Air Forces were stationed here. Later she organized the popular Friends of Music group. Her interest in sketching has produced many interesting water colors of local scenes.

Mr. McCall is a native of Florida, his early home having been near Tallahassee in the part of the state that was settled by pioneers among whom were his forebears.
