While "The Sea Breeze" carried no news of earth shaking importance, its 17 issues did chronicle the daily comings and goings of the people of the entire lower peninsula - the events that were of importance in their daily lives. Thus, perusing it can give us some idea of life in pioneer Pinellas County.

Editorially, "The Sea Breeze" spoke up for better roads, a railroad, better mail service, more interest in Sunday School, more harmony amongst the citizens, more cooperation among the settlements on the "point." More then once it spoke up strongly against liquor.

Of interest to rail fans would be several articles in "The Sea Breeze" to the effect that surveyors of the SILVER SPRINGS, OCALA & GULF RAILROAD were working in the area in an apparent attempt to beat the ORANGE BELT to the Gulf of Mexico port on lower Pinellas. The SSO&G actually built to the Gulf at Homosassa in 1888.

In April, 1887 "The Sea Breeze" after issuing Vol. 2, No. 1 was merged into the "Herald." A Mr. Langstreth became publisher and R.E. Neeld became editor. H.M. Langstreth was a resident of Disston City, and was mentioned in the "The Sea Breeze" of December 1, 1886. R.E. Neeld was one of four brothers who came to Florida from Alabama in 1873. He moved to Big Bayou on the Pinellas peninsula in 1876 where he operated a small grocery store. Neeld decendents were still "active, if not prominent" in St. Petersburg in 1972 (2). The final issue of "The Sea Breeze" made no mention of its forthcoming demise, and if any issues of the "Herald" were actually published apparently none have survived.

Some of the settlements mentioned in "The Sea Breeze" and their approximate locations were:

DISSTON CITY (Bonifacio Post Office) Pop. 150 (3) - Gulfport, between Lake View Ave. (Gulfport Blvd.) and the waterfront.

PINELLAS, Pop. 100 - Along the north shore of Big Bayou in the Driftwood area.

NEW CADIZ, Slightly south of 40th St. and 42nd Ave. So., on a point of land which no longer exists.

JOHN'S PASS (a mainland village, <u>not</u> the waterway between Treasure Island and Madeira Beach) Pop. 80 - Between Park Street and the Bay, about where Abercrombie Park is located.

PAUL'S LANDING - Downtown St. Petersburg, on the waterfront.

BAYVIEW, Pop. 150 - On upper Tampa Bay, behind today's Clearwater Mall.

CLEAR WATER, Pop. 75 - On the waterfront of downtown Clearwater.

SOUTHERLAND - Palm Harbor

GRASSY POINT - Port Tampa

The Sea Breeze.

FIRST NEWSPAPER of the LOWER PINELLAS PENINSULA - April 1, 1886

On June 23, 1887 the "Tampa Journal" said:

"In 1885 Mr. (W.J.) McPherson came to Disston City from Deland, and on the first day of the following April (1886) issued the first number of "The Sea Breeze." On the first day of the following April (1887) it was merged into the "Herald."

Thus, in one brief paragraph the beginning and the end of the first newspaper published on the lower PINELLAS peninsula was reported!

In the upper portion of the peninsula the "West Hillsborough Times" had first been published in Dunedin in 1884, moved to Clear Water the same year, moved again to St. Petersburg in 1892 with its name changed to the "St. Petersburg Times."

W.J. (Will) McPherson was one of three sons of Elias B. McPherson who had homesteaded 168 acres of today's St. Petersburg Beach in 1885. Besides "The Sea Breeze", the McPhersons, father and sons, operated a job printing business, a lumber yard, a contracting business, and a general business agency, all in Disston City (today's Gulfport). See Hurley (1), and ads in "The Sea Breeze." Besides all that activity, Elias B. (the father) was superintendent of the Disston City Sunday School.

According to W.J. McPherson's own writings he was a very young man. "The Sea Breeze" of March 1, 1887 said:

"Another voter added to the list in this precinct on February 17th; Ye editor having attained his majority on that day. Congratulations and subscriptions are in order."

So, McPherson was only 20 when he founded "The Sea Breeze."

According to Fuller (2), Page 81, W.J. McPherson was assisted in publishing "The Sea Breeze" by G.W. Bennett, "a veteran newspaperman." ("The Sea Breeze", Vol. 1, No. 1, in an article about Bennett says, "We are indebted to him for assistance in our office.") There are indications in several issues of the paper that E.B. McPherson, W.J.'s father, also had a hand in the publication. Fuller credits Bennett with hand cutting, from a block of black mangrove wood, the flagstaff of the paper, first used in Vol. 1, No. 3. The actual hand cut flagstaff, reproduced above, is on display at the St. Petersburg Historical Museum, and is used as the flagstaff of the newsletter of the St. Petersburg Historical Society.

The Disston City of the 1880's was no metropolis, but it was the largest settlement of lower Pinellas with a population of 150. No other settlement south of Bayview had a population of over 100. Those settlers were farmers, fishermen, small merchants, skilled tradesmen, and a sprinkling of real estate agents. The earliest arrivals had acquired their land by homesteading, generally in blocks of 160 acres or more. Later arrivals had to pay for their land, usually purchasing five or ten acre tracts from one of the Hamilton Disston Land Companies or from one of the homesteaders.
