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

THE GULFPORT CITY COUNCIL MEETS ON THE FIRST AND THIRD TUESDAY OF EACH MONTH AT 7:30 PM, CITY HALL.

From the minutes of the Council Meetings held during January.

ORDINANCE AMENDING ZONING ORDINANCE

Second Reading and Public Hearing of an Ordinance amending the Zoning Ordinance to permit conditional use in R-3 Multiple Dwelling District for in and out dry storage of boats. No reply at Public Hearing. Mr. Williams moved adoption of Ordinance on Second and Final Reading. Approved.

VOLUNT EER FIREMEN--INSURANCE POLICY

Council authorized increase in Volunteer Firemen's Insurance benefits. The present insurance as approved now pays \$80 per week on sickness and \$8,000 on life. This became effective on January 10. City Agent for this policy is Mr. Wm. Weichman.

POLICE CRUISER- GRANT MOTOR ONLY BID

City Manager reported to Council only one bid had been received although invitations to bid had been sent to a number of dealers. The one bid received was from Grant Motor Company on a 1964 Police Deputy. Council voted acceptance of bid.

GULFPORT SAILING CLUB- REQUEST CHANNEL DREDGE

Mr. MacNeill moved the request of the Gulfport Sailing Club for City to dredge channel into their leased property be granted. Council approved.

FREE USE OF BQAT SLIP- HARBORMASTER & BLDG INSPECTOR Council moved and approved free use of boat slip at Yacht Basin to the Harbormaster and Building Inspector in return for their services for the City with their boats.

EXPENDITURE OF CHAMBER FUNDS FOR MAILING NEWSPAPER Council approved the expenditure of money in Chamber of Commerce brochure fund. Mr. Williams outlined the proposed precedure which was to use some of the money placed in a fund for a Chamber of Commerce brochure for the purpose of underwriting the cost of mailing to the citizens of Gulfport a copy of a monthly newspaper printed for the citizens of Gulfport. Mr. Clymer stated he was in agreement with a suggestion made by Mayor MacNeillat a prior meeting that a portion of the fund be used for this purpose. Mr. Clymer then moved transfer of \$300 to the Chamber of Commerce for the cost of mailing the proposed publication to the citizens of the City. Approved.

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ECITY MANAGER'S DESK

Report from City Manager

This is the first of what we hope will become a regular series of articles concerning your City's administration. Good communication between citizens and their public servants is an essential factor in creating and maintaining a spirit of cooperation and understanding. Your support and encouragement will assure the proper growth and development of our City.

In this column and in the others written by various members of the administrative staff we will attempt to keep you informed on all vital matters affecting the services and operations of your

City government.

The drainage project along 15th Avenue and Gulfport Boulevard has been completed. However, the system will only be partially effective until it is connected to the 49th Street line. The 49th Street project from Central Avenue to Boca Ciega Bay is under the supervision of the State Road Department and work should begin this month. The project will start at the Bay and run north toward Central Avenue. After the drainage has been installed the street will be repaved and improved.

The Gulfport Beach has undergone several improvements in the last few months and will be completed in time for the spring and summer swimming season. New shelters will be constructed and more palm trees will be added to those already in existance.

Sidewalk projects are now being planned on 58th Street between 7th and 11th Avenues and on 52nd Street between 8th and 11th Avenues. These are two much needed additions to our sidewalk program and will be particularly helpful to children going to Disston Jr. High School and Boca Ciega High School. During the month of January the City received one new Ford Police cruiser and during the month of February a second new cruiser will be added to the Police fleet. These cars replace old equipment which is going into well deserved retirement.

Residents of the west side of 44th Street South were recently requested to express their opinion concerning the desirability of installing a small drain with the cost to be assessed to the property owners. The results are not yet complete because we want every property owner to have an opportunity to express his approval or to voice his objections to the project.

In future articles various civic problems will be discussed in our continuing effort to keep all citizens as well informed as possible. In this connection you are reminded to listen for the

In the year 1963 your Council voted monies for the following

projects and they have been completed: 1- Partial construction of complete drainage for our city including areas: 15th Avenue from 49th Street to Gulfport Blvd. Beach Blvd. from 15th Avenue to 20th Avenue. Gulfport Blvd. from 49th Street to 52nd Street. Extension of drainage pipe from Shore Blvd. out into the Bay in three different places. 2- Completed new beach (pumped in) extending from 54th Street to 58th Street. 3- Beautification of beach area, through the removal of dead pines and the planting of palm trees the length of the beach area. 4- The installation of sidewalks on 11th Avenue from 49th Street to 58th Street, and along Gulfport Blvd, between 49th Street and 58th Street extension. 6-Removal of all dead pine trees that were destroyed by last year's freeze. 7- The purchase of autos, trucks and rolling stock by the City. 8- The remodeling and expansion of City Hall to double its size. 9- Air conditioning of the Gulfport Library. 10- Hiring a Recreation Director, now providing for an all year-round program for the young and old alike. 11- The building of additional boat slips at the Marina which has been proven very profitable in as much as it represents one of the best in the area.

These were not all the projects your City was involved in last year, however, they do represent the major ones. Next month I will try to bring you up to date on projects we are planning for 1964. Or better yet, please try to attend our Council meetings held the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of every month at City Hall.

Do you ever wonder what the teens of Gulfport are doing these days? terment of their school and city.

To begin with, we'd like to tell you about ourselves. We're both normal, healthy, seventeen year old seniors at Boca Ciega High School. 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
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
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GULFPORT PUBLIC LIBRARY

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It's So Nice to Know You...

Dr. Harlan Worthley

Dr. Harlan Worthley (who prefers to be called Mr.) and his wife Ruth, chose Gulfport for their retirement home some three years ago.

During our interview, I asked Harlan if he was satisfied with their choice. He couldn't say enough good things about Gulfport; its friendliness, charm and just good living. Going to his desk, he picked up a clipping showing a twenty-four inch snowfall in his former hometown. Pointing to one of the vivid illustrations of the "Winter Wonderland, and with a twinkle in his eye, he said, "This is one of the best reasons for my enthusiasm for the South."

It is hard to know just where to begin when doing a thumbnail sketch of Harlan, for (according to American Men of Science and Who's Who) he seems to have packed several careers into one busy lifetime before his retirement.

His first "profession," which was both lucrative and enjoyable throughout his active years was singing. First a boy soprano, his tenor-baritone later helped pay expenses at the Massachusetts Agricultural College through Church Choir and solo work, and glee club coaching.

In the year 1917, he interrupted his studies to serve in World War I. As an Infantry lieutenant, he saw action with the 42nd (Rainbow) Division in five major battles, through which he came unscathed.

Returning to school in Massachusetts, he received his B. Sc. degree in Entomology in 1920, and the M. Sc. degree in 1923. Years later, as a full professor on sabbatical leave from Penn State, he received the Ph. D. degree from Ohio State in 1939. The University of Massachusetts crowned his academic career in 1949 with the honorary degree of Doctor of Science,

In 1942, with the nation again at war, Harlan volunteered, and was soon commissioned a Major, and assigned to the Chemical Warfare Service, where he first trained chemical weapons battalions. By 1944 he had attained the rank of Colonel, and was placed in charge of a new program of research and development in biological warfare, for his contributions to which he was awarded the Army Legion of Merit medal.

In 1946, when he was relieved of active duty, he embarked on a third career. Tendering his resignation to Penn State, he accepted a position as Director of the Technical Development Department in the Research and Development Division of Merck & Co., Inc. Three years later he was invited back to Washington, where he wound up his colorful career with twelve years service in the office of the Secretary of Defense in the Pentagon. Shortly before his retirement in 1961 he received a civilian award for "Distinguished service in the field of biological and chemical warfare and defense.

I asked Harlan his opinion of the controversial book "Silent Spring" by Rachel Carson. He feels that the book is factually correct and well written, but he remarked with a grin that people would be up in arms if the County stopped the fogging program for mosquitoes in the summer, even though it does upset the balance of nature. He indicated that Mrs. Carson might have given more recognition to the research already being done to alleviate the situation and to over-ride the bad effects of the chemical warfare we are waging against worrisome and destructive bug life. But he agrees that solutions will require much more time and study, and that the book, already reprinted in French and German, will stimulate these studies.

Dr. Worthley still speaks with the perfect and clear enunciation of the lad who was chosen orator of his High School graduation class in Somerville, Massachusetts, a suburb of Boston, and with the authoritiveness of the professor he was at Penn State.

I, for one, count time spent with Harlan and his charming wife Ruth, as delightfully interesting and informative.

We are glad you like Gulfport, Harlan and Ruth, for we are sincerely glad you are here!



HOME FIRE DRILLS

Schools hold fire drills; theatres and other public places have clearly marked, planned exits arrangements; but in our homes, where fires killed over six thousand people last year, too many families are completely unprepared for fire emergencies.

Protect your family by making lifesaving escape plans now. Then hold family fire-drills regularly to be sure that everyone including the children, knows how to act quickly. Here are pointers to help you:

1. Carefully figure out at least two routes to the outside from every room in the house, especially bedrooms, Allow for fire blocking stairway or hall.

2. Remember that closed bedroom doors will hold back flame and smoke, allowing extra time to escape.

3. For upper floor escape, use any available porch or garage, roofs, ladders, or trees as ways down to safety. Be sure exit windows work easily and, especially, that they are low and large enough to get through.

4. Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet and be sure everyone understands the rule "Once outside- stay out." Plan for fire department notification by street box or neighbors telephone as quickly as the house is clear of people.

Our instructor, Mr. Winston Britt, is one of the most capable instructors in this area.

2. Game Day. This activity for the group of the third through sixth grade level with athletic activities directed by the Recreation Department is held every Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from 3:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. at Hoyt Field.

Saturday morning movies is one of our newest activities. Movies, comedies, and games for the youth are held at the Marina Hall from 9:30 A.M. to 11:30 A.M. each

Saturday morning.

4. For adults we have initiated intermediate sewing and beginners' furniture upholstery classes held at Marina Hall on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings under the direction of Tomlinson Adult Education. These two classes were extremely well received and by the second session had been filled to capacity.

5. The teen dances held on Saturday night at the Gulfport Casino has had attendance since August 1, 1963 of over fifteen thousand teenagers. These dances are supervised by the Gulfport Recreation Department.
