If in these colors you believe, Then put this emblem on your sleeve

These words appeared on a postcard mailed on March 7, 1908 to Miss Thelma Walden Littlefield of Middleburg. The card is one of several sent to her in 1907 and 1908 that relate to Mardi Gras in New Orleans. Each card features the festive motifs and the bright green, yellow and purple colors associated with Mardi Gras.

Like many young women of her day, Miss Littlefield saved her colorful postcards. Her extensive collection of personal possessions, photographs, books and furnishings at her former property "Hard Lodging" near Union Bridge was bequeathed to the Historical Society in 1994. The large collection contains heirlooms from the Walden, Littlefield and Shriner families of Carroll County.

Photo Caption 1: Postcard with an embroidered silk flag inscribed "REX" that the recipient was to remove and sew on their blouse or shirt. The cards illustrated here are from the Historical Society of Carroll County Collection, Bequest of Mrs. Thelma Walden Littlefield Shriner, 1994.

Photo caption 2: Postcard, "King of Carnival, Mardi Gras, New Orleans, La." Made from an photograph, this card shows a seated King Rex on a float during the Mardi Gras Parade. This c. 1907 unused card was printed in Germany for the Rotograph Co. of New York, N. Y.

Photo Caption 3: The green, yellow and purple Mardi Gras flag dominates this card sent to Miss Littlefield from New Orleans on February 6, 1907. It was printed in Germany for Raphael Tuck & Sons, who noted that their firm was "Art publishers to their Majesties the King and Queen."

Photo Caption 4: A jester's head was used with the Carnival Flag on this card which was part of a series of "Carnival" postcards produced by Raphael Tuck & Sons.
