"When I listened to Christy Heron-Clark, born and raised in Paradise, read an essay about her family who lost everything in the Camp Fire, I asked her if she'd collaborate on Simple Objects, drawings and photographs of everyday things. In January 2019, Christy and I made the first of two trips to see what remained of the homes she grew up in. Christy's grandfather designed and built the house that used to stand next door to her parents'...Both Christy and I feel like this has been a contemporary archaeological dig of sorts, an insane journey – of grief for what was, and fear for what might be – as we search for a way forward through reality, to resilience." – Stephanie Taylor

"There is a meditative practice that seeks to quiet the mind by working to eliminate labels we normally assign to objects, that negates judgment, of trying to assign meaning or context...These objects are all that is physically left of our houses, and I am working on seeing them in a way that provides a deeper awareness, an understanding of them without having to label them. Even in their destruction, they are vehicles for me to at once see and also to let be...Objects held in suspension, their utility stops here, but their stories continue." – Christy Heron-Clark

She has been creating site-specific installations, murals, and paintings for over 40 years. Her work is in international private and corporate collections.
