Whose daughter was she?

Daughter of Cadmus & Hermione.

Who was Athamas?

King of Thebes.

Had he any other wife?

Yes. Nephele, whom he divorced.

Had Nephele children?

Yes - Phryxus & Helle.

Had Ivo children?

Yes - two, Melicerta & Learchus.

Did she behave well to Phryxus & Helle?

No, she hated them, because they were to ascend the throne in preference to her own children.

What became of them?

They escaped to Colchis on a golden ram.

What became of Ivo?

Ivo was jealous of her, & sent Sisiphos one of the furies to the house of Athamas, & she filled the palace with such fury that Athamas mistook Ivo for a lioness, & her children for whelps, and dashed her son Learchus

against a wall.

How did Ivo escape?

She threw herself from a high rock into the sea, with Melicerta in her arms.

What became of her?

She was changed into a sea deity, afterwards called Lencothoe.

What became of Melicerta?

He was made a sea-god by the name of Palaemon.
