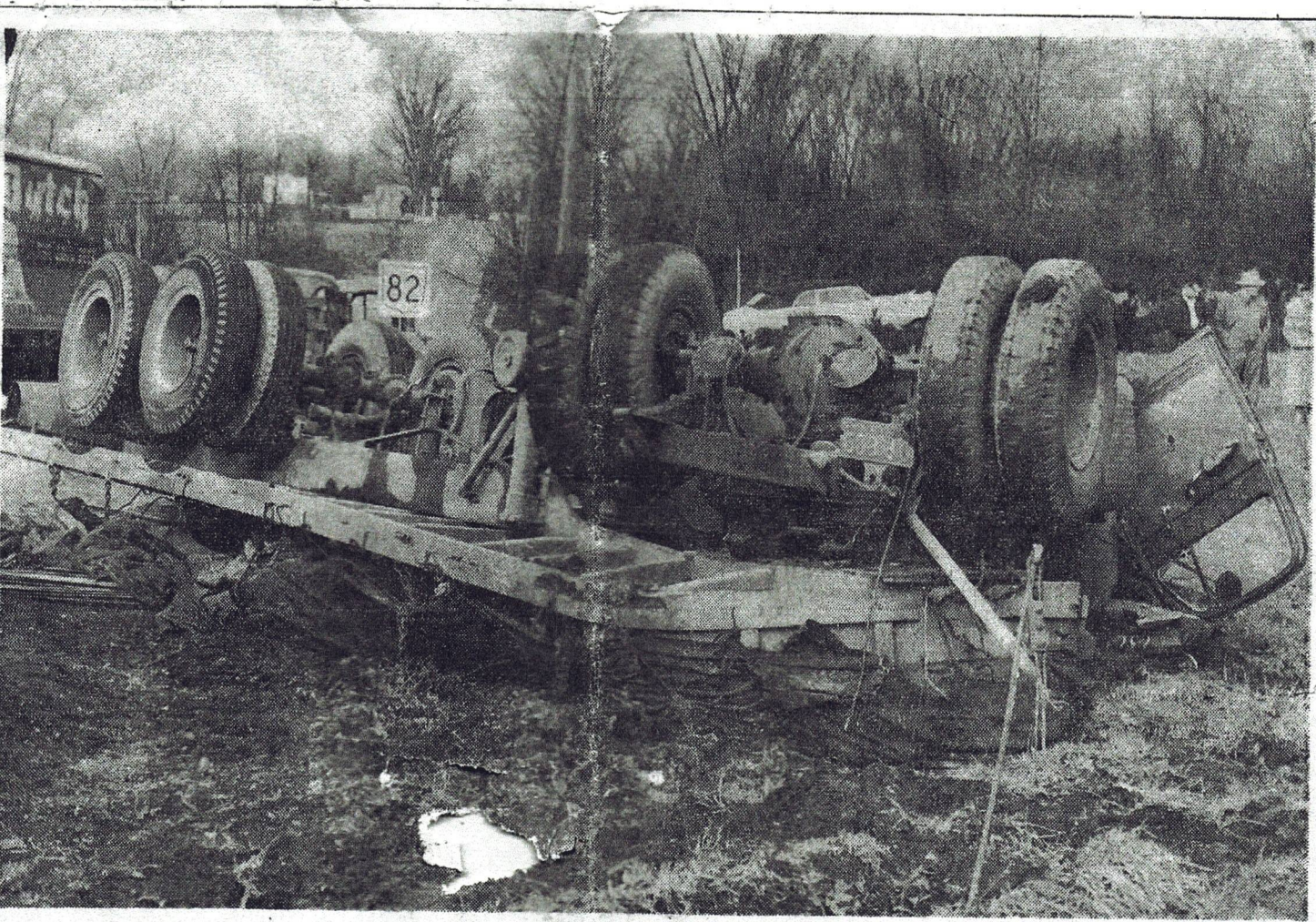

Nurse Hurt as Truck Rams Auto

A nurse driving to her job at Fairview Park Hospital was seriously injured at 6:30 a. m. today when a steel-hauling tractor-trailer crashed a traffic light and struck her automobile broadside at Prospect and Royalton Rds. in Strongsville.

The victim, Mrs. Shirley May, 35, of Emmons Rd., Columbia Station, was taken to Berea Community Hospital with head injuries and a possible concussion.

Driver of the tractor-trailer, John Graham, 31, of East Clarion, told police his brakes failed and he swerved his vehicle dangerously in a vain effort to avoid the passenger car, a 1948 Oldsmobile.

Graham was thrown out of the cab into the street when the tractor-trailer overturned, then added and knocked down a telephone pole from which the traffic light was suspended. He suffered a sprained back and cut the forehead.

Mrs. May, unconscious when taken to the hospital, was identified by a brother-in-law, Charles May, 29, who recognized her car when he drove by the intersection shortly after the crash. He notified her husband, Chester. She has a son, William, 9.

Protest Blocks Secret School Board Meeting

President Charles A. Mooney of the School Board today called off a proposed closed meeting of the board to discuss teacher salaries and school taxes.

Mooney announced the change in plans following a protest yesterday of one School Board member and the Citizens League against the executive session.

"The meeting will be open and fully and publicly announced beforehand," Mooney said.

The school official said he canceled the secret session "because of the misunderstanding that has risen and because of the possible bad effects on a future school levy."

His action came in the wake of criticism by Robert H. Jamison, School Board vice president, who said a private session was inadvisable because it would deprive the public of having "the individual views of public officials on a public question."

Guy Larcom, director of the Citizens League, delivered the same criticism.

Defending his original action,

Mooney said:

"The majority of the School Board thought they were entitled to sit down and, without interruption from interested groups, discuss the financial facts which were made public Friday."

His reference to "interested groups" was interpreted to mean school employee associations, the Chamber of Commerce and realty groups who had representatives at the Friday meeting.

"The board can have the same opportunity in an open meeting, which anyone can attend, but where the talk will be limited to school officials," Mooney said.

Mooney said the date was still undetermined.

He stressed, "to avoid misinterpretation," that the facts and figures being considered were presented publicly at the Friday session at School Board headquarters.

Lausche Hits 3 Million "Loss" in Racing Bet Tax

COLUMBUS, Mar. 25—Refusal of the Legislature to increase the tax on pari-mutuel race betting has cost the state more than \$3,000,000 in revenue, Governor Lausche charged today.

Gov. Lausche, in a letter to O. C. Belt, chairman of the State Racing Commission, said rejection of the administration-sponsored tax increase bill "took from the citizens of the state a sum of \$1,313,400 and gave it to the track operators" during the 1951 racing season.

His letter added that the revenue loss this year would total \$1,700,000.

The governor's letter was in reply to Belt's report covering

1951 race track operations and revenues.

"The figures which you submitted re-establish the soundness of the (tax increase) bill which you pressed for and I supported in the last session of the Legislature," the governor wrote.

He added that Belt's report showed the inadequacy of the present Ohio tax, which yielded only \$1,069,155 during the 1951 racing season on total betting of \$50,643,600.

Barbers Eye \$1.50 Fee for Haircuts

A 25-cent increase which will raise the price of a haircut to \$1.50 is in the making, it was learned today.

The increase is expected when the present contract between the AFL Barbers' Union and AFL Employers' Guild expires May 31. Leaders of both groups agree that a 25-cent increase in haircut prices is planned.

Members of the Barbers' Union will meet Thursday night to decide what contract demands to make on the employers' group when negotiations start. Nick Prelock, Barbers' Union chief, said many members want the weekly guarantee increased from \$50 to \$60 for journeymen.

The union and employers agree that to attract apprentices, the guarantee should be increased. It is now \$35, may go to \$50.

Frank Blazina, employers' guild chief, said haircut prices probably will go to \$1.50 after the new contract is signed.
