## KING OF ENGLAND

### BUYS AMERICAN CAR

Purchase of a new Buick by King Edward VIII of England made sensational news in British automotive circles and turned a new page in Empire business history, according to the current issue of Time Magazine.

## CLINTONVILLE, KY., GETS

### IN NEWS WITH 'ODDITIES'

A farmer near Clintonville, Bourbon county, claims a distinction which to say the least is unusual in this section of the state. Where, he asks, is a farm that in addition to producing the usual run of weeds, insects and pole cats has the unenviable honor of serving as a hunting ground for alligators?

Some trappers found an alligator frozen to death in a small creek on the Darnaby farm near Clintonville just after the last big snow began to disappear this winter. The alligator was about three feet long and apparently had been on the farm for some time before the cold weather caused its death.

In digging in the ashes of an old house that recently burned on the Brent farm near Clintonville, an incomplete skeleton of a child was unearthed near the chimney in a section that formerly had been under the floor of the building. The skull was missing but the remaining portion was in a good state of preservation.

The finding of the skeleton bears no significance to the younger generation of this section, but to the older inhabitants it revived the tales of guerrilla bands of Civil War days whose members were accredited with depredations that included the execution of two slaves, Luke and Bill, who were shoved under the ice of a nearby pond.

## TRANSFER OF 25,000

### BASS AND NEWLIGHTS

Twenty-five thousand newlights and bass have been transferred from the state fish hatchery at Forks of Elkhorn to the four lakes of the New Lake Ellerslie Fishing Club. It was announced by Harvey Smith, secretary of the club.

In making the announcement, Mr. Smith said that the bass weighed from three-quarters of a pound to one pound, and that the newlights—20,000 in number—weighed from a quarter of a pound to one and one-half pounds. He said that approximately 100 of the newlights weigh between a pound and a pound and a half.

Ten thousand of both specials were placed in lake No. 4. Mr. Smith said, and 15,000 in lakes No. 1, 2, and 3.
