Several names are being mentioned in connection with coming Democratic nominations in the 7th Congressional District.

It is stated that the present Representative Hon. Virgil Chapman will be a candidate to succeed himself. Some of his close friends concede he will likely have the race of his life to win this year. Dependence of Senses

For a person who is both blind and deaf to develop the other senses is a most difficult task, as there is no natural compensation of this kind.

Most Primitive People

The natives of Tasmania, even up to the time of their complete extinction in 1876, were considered to be the most primitive people ever encountered in historic times, writes Herbert Hillemer, Cincinnati, Ohio, in Collier's Weekly. They never reached a degree of development, it is believed, much beyond that of the cave men who lived in central Europe more than 25,000 years ago.

Kaolin, a Variety of Clay

Kaolin is a variety of clay, formed by the weathering of granite and certain other rocks. It burns to a pure white, and is used for the manufacture of pottery, such as porcelain and white earthenware. It is also employed in making some kinds of paper and in filling fabrics. Kaolin is found in a good many places in the United States, and though this country still imports a good deal of it, the domestic production is steadily rising. Vermont, Connecticut, Pennsylvania, Delaware, North Carolina and Georgia all have productive deposits.

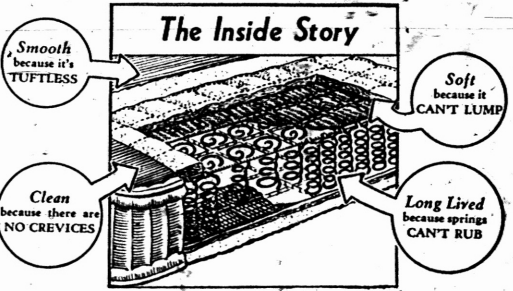
