HOW U. S. CHAINS RADIOPCAST NEWS OF KING'S PASSING

Announcement of the passing of King George V of England at 6:55 p. m. eastern standard time, Monday, Jan. 20, 1936, found the radio networks in the United States ready to handle speedily the various tributes to His Majesty which followed in rapid succession.

Actual announcement of the news flash from Sandringham House reached American networks at 7 p. m., just as some of the popular network programs were about to go on the air. Immediately following these programs at 7:15 the National Broadcasting Company linked with London and the beat of muffled drums and chimes were heard in Great Britain's first tributes to her departed monarch.

The National Broadcasting Company followed this London transmission with a short program of concert music of solemn character while an announcer gave a short resume of the King's reign.

Fitly enough it fell to Boake Carter, an English news commentator on American networks, to deliver the first spoken obituary to the King.

King Edward VIII belies in appearance his age of 41 and looks much younger. He is 5 feet 6 inches tall and weighs about 125 pounds. He has youthful features, with a high, almost florid complexion. His hair is flaxen, or straw colored, and he has bright blue eyes.

More than 493,000,000 people, scattered about the world over 13,909,782 square miles of British soil, now call Edward VIII King and Emperor. The British Commonwealth of Nations over which he rules—and upon which never sets—comprises possessions on every continent and in every sea. Men of every race and religion are his subjects.

Liberals, pain in neck

All my life I have been hoping to meet some one who would give a satisfactory definition of a "liberal." I read regularly the two most influential "liberal" magazines in this country, and in every issue they tell me everything that has been done wrong that week, both at home and abroad.

Far from "liberal" in their characterization of those of whom they happen to disapprove, they make very clear all the things they are against, but I have been trying for years to find out what they are for. What sort of social set-up do they think would work? Aside from venting their jealousy and wrath on all who have happened to get along in the world, what other program do they have? By what rule or circumstance do people happen to get themselves classified as "liberal" or "reactionary?"

A certain famous Senator, whose gymnastics I have watched for thirty years, has been on all sides of most questions except those which involve votes in his home state. On those questions—silver juggling, pot-control, Townsend Plan, or whatever, you always know where to find him. Yet he is a "statesman" and a great "liberal."

I sometimes wonder if professional liberalism is so much a matter of thought as of torpid livers and unfortunate financial experience. People whose livers are active, and whose affairs progress, believe in the country and want to see it go ahead.

This is an exaggeration, of course; not a fair statement. But the mental snootiness of professional "libertines" has long given me a pain. I wish I knew why they are, what they want, and what evidence they have that things would be better if they were given what they want.

UNIFORM STANDARDS URGED FOR U. S. SCHOOLS

A proposal to co-ordinate educational policies in the United States and set uniform standards for all types of schools was discussed Jan. 19 at a meeting of the educational policies commission of the National Education Association.

An appraisal of the purposes of the educational system in a democracy with relationship of the schools to the public will be made, officers said, before the commission holds its next meeting in May. A. J. Stoddard, superintendent of schools in Providence, R. I., was elected chairman of the commission and William J. Carr, of Leland Stanford University, secretary.
