SCOTT

Isaac M. Scott, 78 years old, died at 2:30 Thursday, February 27, 1936, at the A. D. Price Memorial Hospital after some weeks of serious illness. Mr. Scott, prominent farmer and stockman, was a splendid citizen who was universally respected and liked. He was the son of Joe and Amanda Moore Scott and was born in Adams county, O., Dec. 2, 1860. He came to Mercer county 49 years ago. He was married Dec. 9, 1884 to Miss Minnie Grey. She died sometime ago and he is survived by four sons and a daughter, Harvey and Stanley Scott, of Harrodsburg; Walter Scott, of Danville; Edgin Scott, of Washington, D. C.; and Mrs. Virginia Denny, of Wilmington, O. Two children preceded their parents in death, Katherine Florence Scott, May 23, 1900, and Isaac Shelby Scott, Feb. 20, 1920.

A sister, Mrs. Dora Greirson, of Detroit, Mich., is the only surviving member of Mr. Scott's immediate family.

The funeral was at 2:30 Saturday at the Harrodsburg Baptist church, where he had been a member for many years. The service was conducted by Rev. W. E. Mitchell, of Lexington, assisted by the Rev. J. D. McClung, pastor of the Shawnee Run Baptist church. Burial was beside his wife in Spring Hill cemetery. The service was attended by a large crowd of friends.
