HEROES OF AMERICAN HISTORY



JOHN PAUL JONES

The encounter between Jones's ship, the "Bon Homme Richard," and the British frigate, the "Serapis," was one of the most famous sea engagements of history in a fierce three-and-a-half-hour battle, fought by moonlight. Jones, his own ship badly shattered, nevertheless forced his superior opponent to strike her colors.

THE FATHER of the AMERICAN NAVY

Jones was born in Scotland, his real name being John Paul. He was reared on the sea, and at the outbreak of the American Revolution he equipped a small fleet to harass English shipping. His surprise attacks and daring coups struck terror in the hearts of the British and earned the sympathy of Europe for the American cause.



After the war, Jones was invited by Russia to lead up her navy. Discredited through the leaders of the Russian officers, he returned to Paris, where he died. In 1913 his body was belatedly brought to America to be buried at Annapolis.

Miss Maud Smalley, of Danville, formerly of Harrodsburg, and Miss Cox, a teacher in Danville, were visitors at the Park Sunday.

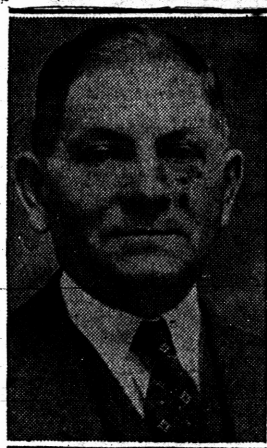

NATIONAL HONORS FOR J. M. FELTNER

J. M. Feltner, London, Ky., assistant state agent in 4-H club work for the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, has been selected as one of three persons in the Central States to receive national honors for services to agriculture. The honors were bestowed by the Epsilon Sigma Phi, national honorary fraternity of agricultural extension workers.

Mr. Feltner began agricultural extension work in 1910, when he established, as a cooperative project for the Sue Bennett School at London and the College of Agriculture of the University of Kentucky, the first soil experiment field in the state. For 18 years he has been actively engaged in 4-H club work in Eastern Kentucky, and now supervises the activities of more than 10,000 boys and girls.

ANTIQUE DEALER, WELL KNOWN HERE, DIES

Antique collectors in Harrodsburg are interested in the death of Mrs. Ella Haggard Ducros, who died in Winchester, Saturday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. I. H. Browne, after an illness of four months. 'Quick Count' Becomes Law

Measure Allowing Tabulation of Votes Immediately After Polls Close Signed by Governor.

Beginning with the next election Kentucky will start counting votes on election night like the other 47 states.

Governor Chandler completed enactment of the "quick count" election law Thursday by signing an act of the 1936 legislature. It provides that counting shall begin at 5 p. m. on election day, one hour after closing of the polls.

Counting is forbidden on Sundays and holidays, but otherwise it may be counted until completed, or until any time set by the county election commission. Each county must tabulate returns until midnight following the election. If the count stops at midnight, it must be resumed at 8 a. m. the next legal day.

Except for these provisions the "honest election law" passed in 1932 was left intact. All ballots must be brought to the county court house immediately after closing of the polls. The chairman of each of the two dominant political parties may designate one or more persons "to assist the county clerk and other guards."

Ballot boxes remain triple locked until opened by the election commission.

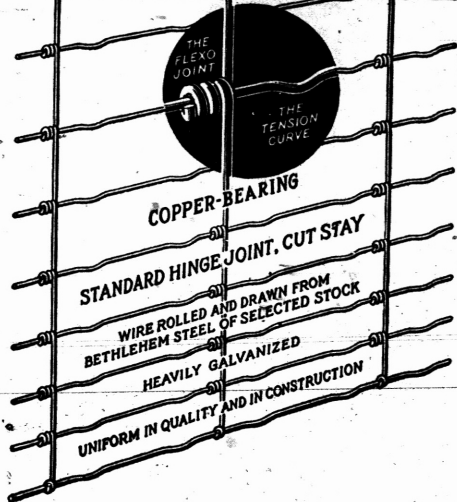
