The cows are small and do not give over three quarts of milk at a milking, but their milk is very rich. The third and last Island is some distance below the Island of Alderney, and is the Island of Guernsey and has many cattle and people on it. The cattle are good milkers and are generally brown with some white. I do not think the milk is as rich as either of the others. There are a great many Guernseys in this country and they are well liked. This breed of cattle is very gentle and kind.
