

AFFIDAVIT-

The affiant, Robert <sup>E.</sup> Brown, states that he believes and has reasonable grounds to believe that there is intoxicating liquors in the house occupied by Victoria Williams, a colored woman, who resides in a little house on the farm of Warren Curd. Said house is made of shiplap lumber and tarred paper with paper on the outside held by weather strips. It has two rooms or compartments and is located within a few feet of the property of the Kentucky Hydro Electric Company and has never been painted. It is in Mercer County, Ky. It is the first house South of Miller's restaurant and on the eastside of the road and about 100 yards from said restaurant and is only one story high.

He says that the grounds and foundation of his belief are as follows, Viz: A crowd of fellows frequent this place and are fellows who are addicted to the use of intoxicants; that he, the affiant, has frequently purchased whiskey there himself within the last few weeks; that he purchased 1/2 pint at this house night before last from a fellow named Knob Jones, who hangs around there most all the time. He said at that time the said Jones had several 1/2 pint bottles and cocoa cola bottles full of said whiskey. He says that he has frequently seen drunken men around this place and has seen them going in and out of this place in a drunken condition at times when the said Knob Jones was there.
