### OFFICIAL CALL FOR MERCER COUNTY DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

Pursuant to the action of the Democratic State Central Executive Committee for the Commonwealth of Kentucky at a meeting held at Frankfort, Ky., May 14th 1936, a call is hereby issued for a mass meeting of the Democrats of Mercer county, Ky., to be held at the County Court House in Harrodsburg, Saturday, June 6th, 1936, at 2 p. m. Central Standard time for the purpose of selecting delegates to the State Democratic Convention at Louisville, Ky., Tuesday, June 9th 1936. Said state convention is for the purpose of selection of delegates to the National Democratic Convention at Philadelphia, June 23rd 1936, for the selection of Democratic candidates for the offices of President and Vice President of the United States, and adopt such rules and regulations for the government of the Party as deemed necessary.

In the County Convention, all known Democrats who will be qualified by law to vote in Mercer county at the regular election to be held Nov. 3rd 1936, are qualified to participate in the convention.

Under the rules adopted by the State Central Executive Committee Mercer county is entitled to send 19 delegates to the State Convention.

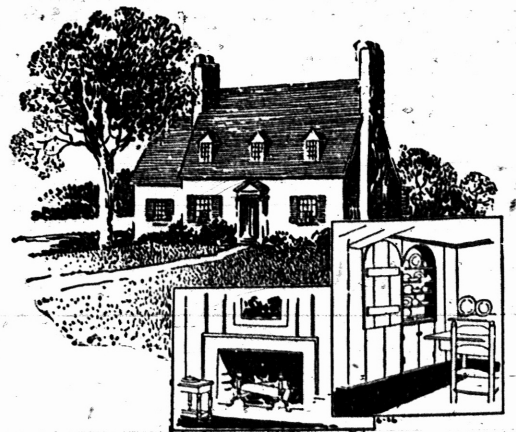

### RELICS OF DANIEL BOONE

W. T. Lutes, of Berea, has a fleshing rock, used by the Indians and some of the early Kentucky pioneers to dress hides of animals. On one side was carved the inscription "D. Boone," and on the other the date of 1775.

Mr. Lutes said the fleshing rock, which is about six inches long and three inches wide, tapering on one end like an axe, was found by his father, H. M. Lutes, soon after the latter moved to a farm in Rockcastle county in 1865. For 70 years it has been used in the Lutes family to crack walnuts and as a door-stop. On the same Rockcastle county farm, Mr. Lutes added, there formerly was a poplar tree on which the name "D. Boone" was carved and he saw this tree and the inscription many times when he was a boy.
