## AUTOS ARE THICKEST IN LOS ANGELES

There is a passenger automobile in use in the United States today for about every 5.4 persons or a little less than one car per family. However, the distribution of cars is far from uniform. In New York and Chicago there is only one car to each 12.1 or 8.7 persons respectively as contrasted to one for each 3.2 persons in Los Angeles and 4.3 in Detroit. For 93 cities of more than 100,000 population, the average is 6.1 persons per passenger car.
