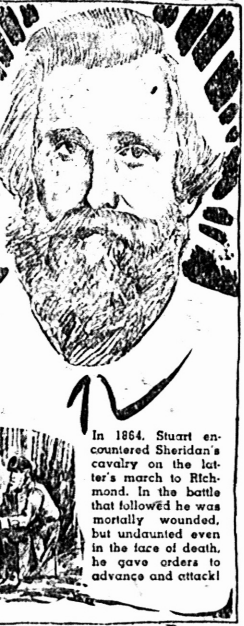


HEROES OF AMERICAN HISTORY

THE REBEL CAVALIER
JAMES E. B. STUART

James Ewell Brown Stuart, known by his troopers as "Jeb," studied at West Point and then entered the U. S. Army. After seeing service on the Texas frontier and in Kansas, he assisted Colonel Robert E. Lee in suppressing the Harper's Ferry raid. When Virginia seceded from the Union, he resigned from the army to share in the defense of his native state. A dashing, colorful leader, Stuart, though still under 30, distinguished himself from the outset for his coolness and personal bravery. Always willing to fight, he led his horsemen on brilliant and daring raids in which he destroyed Union stores and communications, obtained valuable information and in general harassed and checked the Northern armies. In one campaign, Stuart's troops completely circled the Federal forces.



In 1864, Stuart encountered Sheridan's cavalry on the latter's march to Richmond. In the battle that followed he was mortally wounded, but undaunted even in the face of death, he gave orders to advance and attack!

Seventy-five dollars will be retained by the league for purchase of equipment and other necessary expense in opening the season next year.

AT LAWRENCEBURG HOME

A son of the late John Dowling who came to this state from Ireland and engaged in first the cooperage business and then the manufacture of whiskey, deceased became active in the business in 1903 and held interests in the D. W. Distillery at Juaréz, Mexico. He was also interested in the Dowling Bros. distillery now in operation at Burgin.
