## School Notes

### FAIRVIEW HIGH

There was a bustle in the halls of Fairview high school Monday morning, Sept. 7, 1936, when school started. The students were very much pleased on returning to find two new rooms and a gymnasium at their disposal.

The enrollment this year is 184 students; 60 in high school and 124 in the grades. The enrollment in each grade is as follows: 1st grade, 20; 2nd grade, 20; 3rd grade, 12; 4th grade, 14; 5th grade, 15; 6th grade, 10; 7th grade, 16; 8th grade, 17; freshmen, 22; sophomores, 15; juniors, 9 and seniors, 14.

Miss Herta Brown, a new music instructor, has begun giving her first music lessons to a class of nine.

The high school classes met recently and elected class officers and advisers. The seniors elected Grover B. Sanders, president; J. W. Stevens, vice president; Rosamond Sims, secretary-treasurer; and Prof. W. C. Stevens, class adviser.

The Juniors elected David Davenport, president; H. C. Wells, vice-president; Virginia Gritton, secretary-treasurer; and Mr. J. W. Dennis, class adviser.

The Sophomores elected Mabel Gritton, president; Irene Cosby, vice-president; William Cole, secretary-treasurer; and Mr. Bruce Champion, class adviser.

The Freshmen elected Agnes Taylor, president; Margaret Ann Sims, vice-president; Blanche Gritton, secretary-treasurer; and Miss Frances Honchell, class adviser.

The students of the high school have commenced the study of parliamentary law and court procedure. The officers chosen for the court are as follows: Grover B. Sanders, judge; Owen Lee Speake, assistant judge; William Cole, sheriff; and Ruth Robinson, clerk. Parliamentary law procedure will be carried on twice a week hereafter dealing with interests of the student body. Court will meet for a short while on Friday afternoon.

The students of last year and the year before seemed to think parliamentary law was as beneficial as any one subject they had.

### McAFEE SCHOOL

The McAfee graded and high school opened on Monday Sept. 7, with an enrollment well over 200. Pupils were registered and classified and all classes met in regular order the following day.

On Friday, Sept. 11, the first chapel service of the year was held in the new gymnasium. After the devotional exercises new students and faculty members, Misses Lelia Harris, Margaret Speake and Margaret Mayes were introduced and general directions for the year were given by the principal, Mrs. Harned. Brown, secretary of the Mercer County Board of Education, and Miss Mayme Kelly, attendance officer, who brought their good wishes for a successful year, and congratulations upon the splendid gymnasium. Flowers for the occasion—several very large bouquets of handsome zinnias—were the gift of Miss Mary Dunn, whose kind thoughtfulness is sincerely appreciated.

Mr. T. G. Harned, accompanied by his stock judging team composed of Leroy Keller, Billy Gentry and Carl McAnly, spent two days at the State Fair last week. The team entered the Fat Livestock Judging Contest and out of 39 teams competing, individual scoring honors went to Leroy Keller, who took first place in the entire contest in judging swine and Billy Gentry, who finished fifth in judging sheep. The team also finished fifth in the judging of sheep.
