STATE ROAD DEPARTMENT FUND 2 YEARS \$24,814,000

Estimated revenues of the state highway department for the two-year period which began April 1, 1936 and will close April 1, 1938, were fixed at \$24,814,000 by James W. Martin, chairman of the state highway commission.

Of the total road fund estimated for the next biennium of the highway department, Chairman Martin fixed \$12,400,000 as the revenue for the fiscal year to end April 1, 1937, and \$12,314,000 for the year to end April 1, 1938.

In arriving at his figures for the year 1936-37, Chairman Martin estimated that \$10,625,000 would accrue from the five-cent gasoline tax, \$275,000 from motor transportation taxes and \$1,500,000 from automobile registrations.

For the last year of the biennium Chairman Martin estimated that \$14,000 additional would accrue from automobile registrations.
