### BOY FALLS FROM RUNNING BOARD; CRITICALLY HURT

Lee Elmer Bishop, 20, Lancaster High school student, was injured critically there Monday afternoon in an unusual accident involving an automobile, a highway sign and the wind.

The youth, riding on the running board of a machine and carrying a large road sign, was thrown from the car when a stiff wind banked against the sign, causing Bishop to lose his balance.

He fell to the paving on Lexington street over which the machine was traveling at the time and sustained a fracture at the base of the skull and a broken nose.

Bishop was removed to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Bishop, on the Stanford road near the city limits. Physicians described his condition as critical.
