It was a stone slab about eighteen inches wide and six inches thick, with certain lettering on it now very indistinct. The old marker has been dug up recently, as some improvements are being made on that corner and is now lying near the gutter waiting to be hauled off. 50 FINED IN METCALFE  
FOR NOT BUYING DOG TAGS

Circuit Court convened in Metcalfe county Monday with Judge Fulton presiding. It was "dog day" according to persons who attended court. Over five hundred Metcalfe citizens were indicted for not having a tag for their dog, which kept the court busy all day. Two hundred and fifty summons had been served on persons not having tags and 50 were convicted. They were fined \$1 and costs which totaled \$6.60 each.

On the strength of the court's action 200 dog tags were sold at the sheriff's office in Edmonton during the day. This is fine for the sheep and stock claims.
