RESETTLEMENT HOUSING IS PUSHED IN SOUTH

Construction of 506 homes and farmstead units in Region Four of the Federal Resettlement Administration, with headquarters in Raleigh, has been completed, it was announced.

Included are 102 units for family occupancy on the Penderlea Homesteads project near Willard, N. C. This community is about 40 miles north of the seaport of Wilmington, N. C., and when fully completed, it will have 142 farm units, averaging about 20 acres each. Small, comfortable homes with modern conveniences, are being constructed. Besides Penderlea, projects are under construction at Newport News, Va., Tygarden Valley, W. Va., and Reedsville, W. Va. The Newport News project includes 78 units, while 170 are planned for Tygarden Valley and 165 for Reedsville.

Figure Pounds Of Food For Family

It takes 15 1/4 pounds of bread cereals or baked goods a week to keep a family of four persons in a healthy, vigorous and moderately contented state, the University of Kentucky home economics department found in a study of diets at minimum costs. The estimate is based upon active adults, and a girl 12 years old and a boy 9.

As to milk, 7 quarts not pints should be consumed regularly every seven days. To afford variety, cheese or some similar dairy product may be substituted, but the quantity should not be lowered. At least 15 eggs should be used and 5 pounds of lean meat or poultry. Fats and sugars should total 3 1/2 pounds each.

Twelve pounds of potatoes will be enough to meet health requirements, and 5 pounds of tomatoes. Leafy green and yellow vegetables are needed in the amount of 7 1/2 pounds. That is, peas, spinach, carrots, cauliflower, lettuce, lima beans, broccoli, etc., should be used plentifully. If the garden makes it at all possible to use a larger quantity of vegetables, it should be done.

Dried beans, peas and nuts are important in the minimum cost diet, and 2 pounds a week are required. Two pounds of dried fruits, and 8 pounds of other fruits and vegetables, are the last items on the list.

Col. John Page it is claimed was the son of Thomas Page of Sudbury, Parish Harrow, County Middlesex, England, and thus related to the Pages Barons of Greenwich, County Kent. The above emigrant who was born about 1628 died in 1692. His tombstone still exists in the Episcopal churchyard at Williamsburg, Virginia.

LAND OWNER WINS ONYX CAVE SUIT

After eight years of litigation, F. P. Lee, landowner near Onyx Cave, has been adjudged owner of part of the cavern and entitled to receive receipts of \$25,000 and 6 per cent interest paid in by tourists and visitors.

The loser is L. P. Edwards, who discovered Onyx Cave several years ago, and who from his business of catering to tourists built a hotel and a camping ground.

The Court of Appeals gave the ruling Monday, holding that since the cave goes under ground owned by Lee and adjoining the property of Edwards, Lee is entitled to part of the proceeds from the cave.

In handing down the decision Monday, the Court of Appeals said that 12 of the 31 objects to be seen in the underground exhibit were under Lee's property, including the Luci Copah River, termed the most attractive of the group by the justices.

The court held Lee should collect one-third of the profits from 1925 through six months of 1926 and estimated the judgment at \$25,000. Lee now has an injunction against Edwards to prevent him taking sightseers under his property.

MERCURY 80. BELOW 15 MILES IN AIR

On exhibition at the American Association for the Advancement of Science sessions Friday was the temperature graph made by a radio meteorograph sent aloft by balloon Wednesday at the University of Rochester, N. Y. It showed a steep temperature gradient from excessive heat on the ground to nearly 80 below zero at 15 miles.

From this data, which indicated a vast bank of cold air spilling in over this region, Dr. F. R. Wilkins, professor of physics, predicted a storm before tonight on Wednesday. As skies were clear and no rain had moistened parched fields for many weeks, doubtful listeners grinned at the prediction. But before night heavy rain began and general unsettled conditions prevailed.

Although the task of the weatherman in summer is admittedly easier than at other seasons, the value of such radioed weather information from balloon ascension is appreciable.

New Rose Gem Petunia Ideal For Window Box



All-America Petunia Rose Gem

The big family of petunias seems to be getting bigger, and of better quality. This year there were several notable additions, and if one were to grow all of the best types and colors in one garden it would have to be a large one indeed.

This continuous influx of new members can only be regarded as a tribute to the vitality of the flower, and its adaptability to almost every condition. Today we can find a petunia to grow anywhere, and of color to harmonize with any other flower or surrounding.

Rose Gem, an Award of Merit winner for 1936, selected by the All-America Petunia Society, is a bright rose color which even the strongest sun will not fade. It has a very compact growth of a bushy habit during its blooming period. This characteristic, along with its small stature, only 6 to 8 inches, make it an ideal border plant, or window box subject.

Like most petunias, it is easily grown, and may be sown out in the open, or started indoors in flats for early bloom and to lengthen the season for them. Because of its compact growth, it should be an excellent pot plant for the open window or sill, and it would not be difficult to put a few plants if you start them indoors, putting the bulk of them in the garden.

In the window box, Rose Gem should harmonize well with a balcony strain of deep blue, the latter to trail over the side and the pink for a center, with a row of sweet alyssum for a white border. These three hardy annuals will stand almost any amount of sun or bad weather, and will provide a sheet of color throughout the summer.
