

Playground Is Well Patronized

Sufficient Money Has Been Raised For A Start And New Equipment Will Be Bought Soon.

Having been in operation over a week now, the new playground on the high school campus has had an ever increasing attendance and has left no doubt in the minds of the promoters of the great need for a supervised playground for the young people of this city.

Although no definite plans have been made as to the future operation of the recreation center, immediate plans are going forward in a hurry. A great deal of new equipment will be ordered within the next few days and many things such as swings, seesaws, slide, etc, are soon to be installed.

The community playground was sponsored at first by the American Legion post here but now other organizations and individuals have become interested and are to be a big help in making this really a community enterprise.

Enough money has been raised to buy a lot of the equipment that is necessary for successful operation. A benefit softball game between the star players of the four church teams here and a team from Danville is being planned for Wednesday night, July 1, the proceeds to go to the playground fund. Curtis Park has been chosen manager of the all-star team.

Except on the very hottest days last week the crowds of children at the playground have averaged well over one hundred. They have been kept busy playing softball, volley ball, tennis, and other action games, hearing stories, etc. Their activities will be even more varied after the new equipment is added. Prof. J. K. Powell, who has been employed as supervisor is giving his entire time to the work and is assisted by a staff of NVA workers whose salaries are paid by the government.

All children between the ages of 6 and 16 are invited to the playground from 4 to 11 in the morning and from 2 to 5 in the afternoon every day except Sunday.

Washington Has a Rock Named for Gen. Braddock

Like Plymouth, Washington has its rock, a rock which for years lay buried under the surface on the site of the Naval hospital, says the Washington Star.

The rock, known as Braddock Rock, was the landing place of General Braddock, for in those days the Potomac river flowed deeply over that section of the Capital.

Braddock, seeking a place to camp for the night, set foot on the rock in reaching shore, and the name of the rock, as a natural consequence, followed.

Braddock's camp, his first on his trip to the Ohio, gave the section now occupied by the unused portion of the Naval hospital the name of Camp Hill.

The Chesapeake & Ohio canal entered the Potomac near the general's landing place. The dirt dug from the canal was piled over his camp and, consequently, over Braddock's Rock.

Back in the early days of the American participation in the World war, existence of the rock was discovered by historical society and a search was started for the rock. Subsequently, it was found 8 feet beneath the surface, in the open court of H building at the hospital. A brick wall and an iron railing surround the historic spot where the British general landed.

British Sailors' Slang Covers All Conditions

Sailors have a unique vocabulary, observes a writer in Pearson's London Weekly.

"Barbatus" or "Scotland Yard" gives warning of the approach of a regulating petty officer. A "Bow Street Runner" is his messenger. An officer's marine servant is known as "Jeeves" or "Flunkey," the signalman is addressed as "Bunting" or "Rag Tearer." The "Idle Rich" are the engine-room artificers. "Jimmy" is the senior lieutenant.

The culinary department has its own particular phraseology. "Grave-chaser" or "Pantry" is the affectionate term applied to the cook. A "Prain Smash" means bacon and tomatoes, sausage rolls are "Dogs in Blankets," while "Two Airlships in a Cloud" means that the menu includes sausages and mash.

The quarter deck, part of the vessel reserved for officers, is known as the "Holy of Holies," and if you "Score a Rattle" or are "In the Jug" in the course of time you are due to appear before the captain as a defaulter.

The "Banner" is the ship's ensign.

Early U. S. Mail Coaches

On September 3, 1808, three commissioners appointed by President Jefferson to lay out the Cumberland (or National) road met at Cumberland, Md., to begin their work. This was the first federal project for the improvement of internal transportation and communication. By 1818 United States mail coaches were running over the road to Wheeling, then in Virginia. Eventually this highway was built westward through Ohio, Indiana and Illinois to St. Louis, Mo. Of it one writer says: "It carried thousands of population and millions of wealth into the West; and more than any other material structure in the land, served to harmonize, if not to save, the Union."

Mahogany

American mahogany have a straighter grain and more mellow texture and are found in logs of longer and wider cuttings. They are a rich, golden brown in tone. African mahogany logs are enormous, sometimes measuring from 14 to 30 feet long and from 3 to 5 feet thick. The wood is of a pale, golden brown color and is lighter in weight, with slightly larger pores, than the other types. Also, it is more lavishly figured. Therefore, it furnishes three-fourths of all mahogany veneers.

Sugar Cane Culture

The cultivation of the sugar cane was introduced into the region now embraced in the United States by some Jesuits in 1751. They planted it near New Orleans and in 1758 a sugar mill was built. The first sugar was made in 1761, but the industry never could be brought to complete success.

When Louisiana was handed over to Spain in 1769 sugar making ceased. It was revived in 1795 through the efforts of Etienne de Bore, and from that time it has grown steadily into vast proportions.


Coyotes Prolific Breeders

May Not Sell So Big A Helping

Sales Tax On Ice Cream, Soft Drinks, Etc., May Be Absorbed By Jobbers and Manufacturers.

The new retail sales taxes that will soon go into effect may be arranged so that neither the inconvenience nor cost of some of them will be visited upon the consumer. The State Tax Commission, which has broad regulatory powers under the new act, is seeking to arrange it so that the retailer and wholesaler will absorb, for instance, the 28 cents a gallon on ice cream; and so that the cone or helping at the counter may be a bit or a dip smaller than now, but at the old price. The same may be done at most dealers in the matter of soft drinks and candies.

Federal Ransom

The United States has paid a total of about \$35,000,000 in ransom for American captives. This ransom or tribute money was paid to the Algerine pirates or the Barbary states on the north coast of Africa in the first decade of the American Republic's existence. Annual payments ceased only after the United States fought and won the Barbary States war, in which such famous commanders as Commodores Decatur, Rodgers and Barron took part.

Effect of Time

Soviet Russia shows its hatred for the former czars through the altered inscription on the statue of Alexander III (1845-1894) in the Square of the Revolution in Leningrad. Replacing the former honorary phrases are the words: "My son and my father were executed and I reap the harvest of immortal shame. I am standing here as a cast-iron scarecrow for the country which has forever thrown off the yoke of despotism."—Collier's Weekly.

Stone-Age Tomb Discovered

Excavations beneath a megalith, a monument of the late Neolithic period near Dunloy, County Antrim, Ireland, revealed the first complete intact prehistoric burial chamber to be found in the British Isles. The report was issued by Queen's university archeologists. In the ancient tomb were found traces of the cremation of human bodies.

Chinese Sturgeons Large

800 Convicts To Share In Bonus

\$500,000 To Fall In Hands Of Prisoners at San Quentin Prison In California.

Nearly \$500,000 fell into the hands of more than 800 felons in populous San Quentin Prison, but the beneficiaries will be unable to spend it in pursuit of their foremost desire—freedom.

This sudden wealth, to come thru payment of the soldiers' bonus, will be credited to the individual accounts of the convicts. They will be allowed to part with it only a few dollars at a time, except in special cases.

Warden Court Smith announced that about 1200 convicts, one of them in condemned row, were eligible to receive the compensation payments but at least 400 had not applied for them.
