

## STOCKYARDS SHIP 44 CARS ONE DAY

Lambs Bring High Prices Here, Have  
Topped State Market All Dur-  
ing Lamb Season.

Men worked far into the night Saturday night at the Mercer County Stockyards as they set an all time record by shipping out forty-four carloads of livestock more than they ever shipped in one day before.

Choice lambs sold from \$12.40 to \$12.70 with 1098 of them bringing an average of \$12.40. On sale were 4,590 lambs which brought the highest prices in Kentucky. The stock yards here have topped the lamb market every week during the lamb market season.

It was learned that Swift & Co., meat packers, buy Kentucky's meat products on just two bonded auction markets in the State, Harrodsburg being one of them. They do this on account of the shrinkage that is not considered on other markets.

It is believed that good lambs with weight will continue to bring good prices here this season.

### R. A. Funds Ready For Co-operative Loans

Farmer co-operative enterprises now may be organized in Mercer county with the aid of funds loaned to such organizations by the Reinvestment Administration, L. H. Jones, County Rural Rehabilitation Supervisor, announced yesterday.

Funds have been made available, Mr. Jones said, for loans to community and cooperative associations and to farm families for participation in such associations as well as in existing co-operatives. This is one means by which the federal government is helping farmers to gain new economic security, he said.

"Loans will be made to co-operatives that submit sound plans on a basis of a real community need for the service," Supervisor Jones said. "There must be assurance such an enterprise will be able to operate on a self-sustaining basis."

Mr. Jones said that he will be glad to receive the suggestions of Mercer County farmers at his office in the postoffice building.
