LOW LAKE WATER CUTS DIX
RIVER POWER PLANT OUTPUT

The drouth has lowered the level of Herrington Lake to such an extent that the Kentucky Utilities hydroelectric plant at Dix Dam has been operated at only about 60 per cent capacity. Harry Blanton, manager of the Kentucky Utilities here, stated that part of the lowering of the volume of water in the lake was due to evaporation during the extremely dry weather.

Normal current has been furnished its customers in spite of the smaller output at the Dix Dam plant, as the Kentucky Utilities has a steam generator in Bell county that supplements the hydro-electric plant.
