LOW LAKE WATER CUTS DIX RIVER POWER PLANT OUTPUT

The drought has lowered the level of Herrington Lake to such an extent that the Kentucky Utilities hydro-electric plant at Dix Dam has been operated at only about 60 per cent capacity. Harry Blanton, manager of the Kentucky Utilities here, stated that part of the lowering of the volume of water in the lake was due to evaporation during the extremely dry hot weather.

Normal current has been furnished its customers in spite of the smaller output at the Dix Dam plant, as the Kentucky Utilities has a steam generator in Bell county that supplements the hydro-electric plant.

FIRE CHIEF PHILLIPS RENAMED TO STATE BOARD

Fire Chief K. B. Phillips was elected treasurer of the Kentucky Fire Chiefs Association which closed Friday a convention of several days in connection with the State Firemen's School conducted at the University of Kentucky, Lexington. This is Mr. Phillips' third term. Scott Penny Sanders, member of the local fire company also attended the school.
